tion that could be ratified and would unite the Fellowship for the future. This committee will meet several times this year to seek God's guidance for their work.

We ask for prayer from individuals and congregations for God to guide the committee. Also, remember the FEBC leadership and commissions as they

revisit their responsibilities for now and the future.

In order for the Fellowship to continue, we must join our hands together in prayer and ask for God's guidance for the future.



Financial Goals:

Is Sharing One of Them?

Why do you work — what is your ultimate goal in earning money?

How do you teach a person with a "welfare" mindset to become fully and permanently self-sufficient, hold down a regular job and become a productive member of society?

The two questions appear to be unrelated. However, in Scripture they are answered in one single principle.

Years ago, I was surprised to discover how simple that principle is.

I was discussing ministry with a French colleague to whom God had given much wisdom, enabling him to have a successful ministry among people who were used to living on government handouts — on welfare. Through his ministry, many of them had become stable, productive members of

society and of his church, having also learned to give generously of their income to the Lord's work. They were no longer in need of financial assistance. I, too, had had opportunity to minister to such, but it seemed that they inevitably fell back into their old way of life. So I was curious. What was his secret?

He simply directed my attention to Ephesians 4:28:

"He who has been stealing must steal no longer, but must work, doing something useful with his own hands, that he may have something to share with those in need."

He pointed out that he had been in the habit of teaching only the first part of the verse: stop stealing and *start working* (I had done that, too). Then one day he realized that the second part of the verse is just as important as the first part: work to have something to share with those in need. There were two steps in the process: one, start *working* and, two, start *sharing*. In discipling new converts he began to intentionally teach them to share with

others. His goal was not merely to get them off the welfare rolls (or off the habit of stealing!). His goal became that of teaching them to work in order to be able to share; to give to others.

My colleague's observation after several years of teaching that principle: Whenever a person took that next step and began sharing with the others, the welfare mindset was broken and the person became a self-sufficient, productive member of the church and society. But if they failed to learn that principle, the cycle was never broken, no matter how much he tried to help them.

I realized that I had failed to apply that principle in my own teaching and discipleship. But I also realized that the principle applied to my own life, not only to my disciplship program for new converts.

No, I didn't have a problem with stealing. No, I didn't depend on the government (or anyone else) for a handout. But what was my goal in earning money? What was my goal in trying to be a good money manager? Was it self-centered? Was it focused on

me? Or was my goal that of helping others? Was it my goal to earn money to increase my ability to give? Or was it my goal to increase my ability to purchase things? Was it to provide for the needs of God's work and God's people? Or was it to provide greater pleasure and security for myself?

Proverbs 11:24-25 says: "One man gives freely, yet gains even more; another withholds unduly

but comes to poverty. A generous man will prosper; he who refreshes others will himself be refreshed."

What is our ultimate goal in earning money? How do we teach a person with a "welfare" mindset to become fully and permanently self-sufficient, hold down a regular job and become a productive member of society?

The answer to both questions is found in the Word of God; in verses like Ephesians 4:28.

Is this the principle we live by? Have we been inculcating this principle in others by our words — and by our example?

"Xianity"???

Let's make Jesus Christ our passion for the New Year.

Xmas — It's not just about Christmas without Christ but about a life without Christ. I have a growing uneasiness, not so much about the world using Xmas at Christmas, but about the Church calling itself Christian without Christ. I fear that so much of our emphasis in ministry has so often been about what I should be doing that we distort the Gospel. Much of the evangelical church today is more about "Xianity" then Christianity.

Paul, the apostle, wrote in I Corinthians 2:2-5 (KJV): "For I determined not to know any thing among you, save Jesus Christ, and him crucified. And I was with you in weakness, and in fear, and in much trembling. And my speech and my preaching was not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power: That your faith should not stand in the wisdom of men, but in the power of God."

He tells us why in I Corinthians 1: 21-29 (KJV): "For after that in the wisdom of God the world by wisdom knew not God, it pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe. For the Jews require a sign, and the Greeks seek after wisdom: But we preach Christ crucified, unto the Jews a stumbling block, and unto the Greeks foolishness; But unto them which are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God, and the wisdom of God ... That no flesh should glory in His presence."

Paul wanted nothing to detract from the glory that be-



longed to Jesus Christ. *Christ crucified* was his singular focus in ministry. *Christ crucified* was the passion of his life. It was Paul's vision statement. That is what kept him focused on what was important.

Following, obeying, being disciples, living for Christ can only come *when* we have cast ourselves, in our sinfulness, unworthiness and weakness, upon the grace and mercy of God. It is only then that we can live by faith in the resurrection power as one who has been forgiven. Discipleship that does not begin at the cross is a counterfeit discipleship. Mercy and grace can only come to us though Jesus Christ and His death on the cross for us. Anything less than that is mere "Xianity." Let's make Jesus Christ our passion for the New Year!

Into the New Year:

Count your BLESSINGS

We've just turned the corner from the holidays — Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Day. Many people were thankful for those days of feasting, enjoying family or a good football game. There is nothing wrong with that, except there is so much more for which to give thanks.

This year I received a book entitled "199 Reasons To Be Thankful." I'm sure there are many more than just 199. It contained the usual things that people name: family, friends, God, the Bible, and many more. It also mentioned some rather unusual ones:

Silence

How many of us fill every day with the noise of music, conversation, television and activities? Many do so to drown out the quiet, which gives an opportunity for thoughts of disappointments, hurts, past experiences and loneliness to creep in. We dread the silence. But it is truly a gift of God when He can speak quiet assurance and contentment to our souls. Isaiah 30:15 says "... in quietness and in confidence shall be your strength" Let us give thanks for silence.

Changing seasons

Here in Nebraska, we had a cold and damp October, followed by a warmer-than-usual November and colder, brisker weather. But then comes spring, as the first flowers burst through the sod. Nature's seasons come and go in orderly fashion with a definite purpose for each one. The same is true for the seasons of our lives. Each has its own lessons and delights. Ecclesiastes 3:1 tells us "To every thing there is a season and a time to every purpose under heaven" Let us give thanks for changing seasons.

Laundry and leftover turkey

Piles of laundry and pounds of leftover turkey may not be the most appealing when we look at them. The laundry is just a chore that must be done over and over, several times a week. With the turkey comes a frantic search for new recipes to please our family. But both of them speak to us of God's abundant provision for us. There are those whose clothes are very meager, so laundry is not much of a problem. And turkey — what is that? We are so blessed to have so much from the hand of a loving

heavenly Father. 1 Timothy 6:17 reminds us that it is "... the living God who giveth us richly all things to enjoy" Let us give thanks for laundry and leftover turkey.

A sense of humor

Some of us have a greater amount of this gift than others. It can be a lifesaver when things are getting out of control around us. Rightly used, it takes the tension out of many a tense situation. Laughter is an outward expression of innermost joy. The giggles of a child, the wholehearted laugh of a teenager, the chuckle of a grandpa, bring such joy to the home. In Proverbs 17:22 we read "A merry heart doeth good like a medicine" Let us give thanks for a sense of humor.

But the most important reason to be thankful is because of Jesus Christ; who He is and what He did. This ties Thanksgiving and Christmas together, and helps us to enter the New Year with confidence. For Christmas, our choir prepared a song entitled "He Still Came." Jesus is God, the all-knowing God. Before He came to this earth to become our Savior, He knew exactly what He was leaving. He knew all that He would have to do to obtain our salvation, down to the smallest detail. He knew the suffering that lay before Him. In spite of all that, He still came. What an awesome thought! Fellowship generosity makes Ukrainian library "the first of its kind"

What a joy it has been to watch the progress of your gifts to Kremenchuk Regional Bible College for their new Library Project! With God's help, you met and exceeded the goal of this year's convention project, and accomplished much in readying the library for use. Students are ecstatic about this wonderful addition. Alexander Zigalenko, director of the Bible college, said that to his knowledge there is no other college library in Ukraine like this: "It's the first of its kind."



"We've never seen such a beautiful, comfortable place; and it is our pleasure to seek and find and make use of resources from here during our studies."

About 15,000 books are already on the shelves (300 meters of shelving were built with your gifts!), and there is room for another 5,000 volumes. Ten reading/study carrels are conveniently positioned around the library. A wall with cabinets was built to store archived material. The wall also has special shelves to display journals, articles, and periodicals. This wall serves to separate the stacks from the after-hours computer lab area. At present, some computer desks still await actual computers.

And all of this has been accomplished with the gifts of the Fellowship!

What remains to be done? We have yet to build the reception/book check-out area (but your gifts have covered the expense of that, too!). Then we wait on God for the funds to purchase two quality computers with a good server that will support the catalog and check-out system. We also hope to

purchase four computers with extensive software for students to use in the computer lab.

Another immediate need — and likely the first to be met — is drapery or window coverings to protect the books from direct/indirect sunlight. Eventually a small room will be furnished to process new books.

What a fantastic environment for learning! Thank you all from the bottom of our hearts for participating in this gift! We are so proud to be associated with you! And we pass along thanksgiving with overflowing gratitude from Alexander Zigalenko, our librarians, and from the current 145 students who will enjoy your gift this year!

Christian Fellowship Chapel Finds a Shepherd in One of Its Own

After more than two years without a pastor, Christian Fellowship Chapel of Winnipeg has a new pastoral couple who come from within the church family. John and Rae Harwood have attended the Chapel for many years. Rae was born into the church, and John began attending in the 1970s. His military career took them away from Winnipeg in 1980, but they returned when he was assigned there in 1992.

John brings more than 30 years of leadership experience after retiring from the Canadian Air Force as a colonel in 2008, following a career in both the regular and reserve force. In between, he pursued a Master of Divinity from Providence College and Seminary, graduating in 2001 with the Scholarship Award as the top student. Adding to her baccalaureate in nursing, Rae graduated from Providence Seminary in 1997 with a master's degree in counselling and has just completed her doctoral studies with Argosy University in counselling psychology.

Since returning to the Chapel, both

John and Rae have been actively involved in the life of the church. John has served as an elder almost continuously from 1992, an adult Sunday school teacher and on the music committee. Rae has focused her ministry in Christian education and counselling.

Why did it take two years to fill the pastoral vacancy? "After not finding a suitable candidate, and after too many overtures from different people to be ignored, I decided I would ask God for some clear signals," John said. "I definitely didn't want to be a Jonah. While preparing to teach a series on Jeremiah, the lessons in the first chapter struck home: God knows us; He appoints us; He will prepare and equip us, and He will see His work accomplished. Then, when my fellow elders sent to me an unexpected formal request, it couldn't get much clearer than that."

This congregation of 63 members and about 40 adherents formally installed John as pastor on Jan. 3. They expressed gratitude to God and the elder board for their leadership during this

stretch without a pastor. The Chapel has enjoyed tremendous peace and unity, and the various programs continued to function smoothly and well.

John said his new challenge includes maintaining the Chapel's current strengths of unity and solid doctrinal teaching, while bringing emphasis to bear on outreach, and legacy — preparing the next generation of leaders in the church.





English Language Learners Program Proves an Effective Outreach Ministry

A new outreach at Community Bible Church in Omaha is opening up many opportunities to share Christ with internationals, as a team of volunteers teaches English while taking advantage of opportunities to share spiritual truths.

Andrea Aleksandrova is one of those volunteers, and leads the English Language Learners (ELL) program, which has about nine students attending regularly. Some have lived in the States for as long as eight years, and some as short as a few months. The students come from Colombia, El Salvador, Mexico, the Dominican Republic, West Africa and India, and from varied walks of life. Each has a different purpose for studying English. One student, a dentist in El Salvador, is learning the language so that she can pass the necessary classes and tests to practice dentistry in the United States. Most students work in the warehouse and manufacturing industries or in housekeeping. Some speak the language well, but need to learn how to read it; others are gaining conversational skills, and still others are simply trying to gain the courage to start speaking English.

Andrea gave leadership to the ELL program after approaching Associate Pastor Rick Bragg about service opportunities at CBC. She is also a student at Grace University in Omaha, and the ELL outreach was an ideal fit for the university's Servant Leadership Training. The CBC Outreach Committee had already discussed offering an ELL class, but needed someone to do the research to see if the ministry was a viable option for the church.

The teacher-volunteers use the Bible as part of their instruction. "A few students are believers, and it is exciting to help these students grow in their faith through this class," Andrea said. "We

have not had any unbelieving students accept Christ yet, but we have had some very fruitful conversations," about such topics as the definition of sin, why people need a Savior, the fruits of the Spirit, and divorce.

Andrea and Pastor Rick agreed that the ELL program has been an effective outreach ministry. Rick expects the class to grow as people share via word-of mouth to others. "It has been a great experience ...," he said. "How the Lord will fully use it ... time will tell." Rick serves on the FEBC Commission on Outreach, and said the commission may benchmark the program in the future.

"Every week it seems like the students and volunteers leave feeling rewarded," Andrea said. "Our volunteers have really invested themselves in this class and in the lives of the students. Personally, I've found it to be one of the most rewarding things I've ever done."
