Owe No One Anything Except ...

Romans 13:8 says, "... Owe no one

anything, except to love each other, for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law" (ESV). While this love has its greatest fulfillment within the body of Christ, it also applies to the way that we interact with non-Christian people around us. But what should loving non-Christians look like in our day-to-day lives?

In order to love or care about someone, we typically need to spend time with them and get to know them. It is hard to care for someone if you have no idea what is happening in their lives. Most of us need to be very intentional about this with non-Christians. If we do not go out of our way to get to know non-Christians, we will find ourselves only spending time with Christians. We will find ourselves only loving Christians.

However, the Gospel calls us to go to the non-Christians with the hope that is found in Jesus. We need to be intentional about spending time with non-Christians.

It is so easy to see the changes of today as a barrier to the way that we used to share the Gospel. However, these very changes often afford new opportunities to share Jesus with non-Christians. A generation ago, one of the most effective ways to reach people was to invite them to church. People thought of the church in positive terms. Most people would think something like this: "I do not

attend church. I am busy, and I am not really into church, but I know that if I am really in trouble that I should go back to church to find help." People saw church as the primary way to connect with God if they had any realization that they needed God.

Today, people have a general cynicism toward large institutions. Whether it is big government, big corporations or big religion, people are disinclined to trust these organizations. People do not think that answers to the important things in life can be found in an institution.

While a non-Christian is disposed to reject religion, they are uniquely poised to receive the love of Jesus expressed through you.

Yet, we owe them love. While a non-Christian is disposed to reject religion, they are uniquely poised to receive the love of Jesus expressed through you. They need to believe that someone cares about them, and then they will seek them out and allow them to speak into their lives.

What are the opportunities to connect with non-Christians? There are many more than I can list, but I will suggest a few:

• Volunteer: Find a place that needs volunteers, and serve as unto the Lord

there. Choose a cause about which you are passionate. You will find non-Christians serving with you who care about similar things. I recently spoke to a Christian woman who was committed to stopping the sex trade. She went to a national meeting of activists. There were dozens of people from across the country there. She said that she was the only Christian there. She has had many open doors to share her faith through this service.

- Hospitality: Most of us have many neighbors who are not believers. Invite them into your home. Get to know them.
 Pray with them. Do things together.
- *Join clubs:* Find something you have a passion for and join clubs where you will find non-Christians with similar interests.
- Social media: Bring Christ to bear when you are making meaningful connections through social media. While we want to avoid preaching condemnation and superficial platitudes, there are often opportunities as unbelievers express their hurts and frustrations. There are often great opportunities to be salt and light.

We owe love to non-Christians. May we intentionally find ways to love them and share Jesus with them.

Donna Schmidt with the Lord

After 54 years of faithful service, Donna Schmidt was called home to the Lord on Dec. 2. Donna was the wife of Loyal Schmidt, an FEBC missionary and pastor.

She arrived in the Congo in 1954 as a medical missionary, while Loyal was serving there under the Congo Inland Mission. The couple married in 1957, but was evacuated with their family in 1960. Although they returned to minister for a couple of more years, the political climate deteriorated, and Loyal was captured in 1964. Upon his release, they moved to California for two years.

The Schmidts then moved to Omaha, Neb., where Loyal worked with Grace Bible Institute (now Grace University). After their two

sons were kidnapped and one killed, they moved to Canada with their three boys and pastored the Langham, Sask., Evangelical Bible Church for six years, followed by Christian Fellowship Church of Rhineland, Sask., for another six years.

Their last move was to Henderson, Neb., to lead Grace Mission. Donna served the mission alongside Loyal, working in the office. Loyal did public relations for Grace Mission and served as director for 14 years. They led teams to Haiti and Mexico. In 1999 Loyal retired from the directorship but continued to serve as office manager, a position he still holds to date.

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

This month we continue to introduce the new missionaries who were approved at the 2014 FEBC Convention. I would like to repeat the qualifications the Commission on Missions looks for in an FEBC missionary candidate. First, and most importantly, the candidate must be born again and have a burden to lead other people to a relationship with Christ. Second, he or she should demonstrate a servant spirit by working in ministries in the local church. Third, a candidate should become well-informed of the doctrinal position and policies of prospective mission agencies, possibly under the direction of the local pastor or missions committee.

It is with that in mind that we introduce to you **Joanne Redekop** from Dalmeny Bible Church. She grew up in a Christian home and hearing missionary reports in church, thinking "It would be so cool to go be a missionary overseas someday." However, she didn't really think that was God's plan for her. Joanne admits, "Throughout school, I grew in my faith, but never shared it with anyone, as I felt that was for others to do, not me. When I was in university, I was challenged to share my faith more, and with



encouragement started to do so. I ended up going on a six-week mission trip to Uganda through Power to Change. It was incredible to see God at work in the words He would give me and the people He would lead us to. After I came back, I felt God calling me back there someday."

After she finished her degree, she worked at a hospital as a registered nurse, and the desire to serve on the mission field kept growing. She attended the Urbana Conference with funding from the FEBC Commission on Missions and then started contacting mission organizations. Africa Inland Mission felt right, as its focus and approach to missions lined up with her passions. "They focus on coming alongside a community, getting to know the people, sharing the Gospel with them, and then discipling them to create a lasting impact."

Joanne will go to Kenya with Africa Inland Mission in January 2015 until December 2016. She will work with an unreached people group that practices spiritism and witchcraft. Joanne will serve on a team with two families, four other single women, and one couple who will be the team leaders. They will use their different talents and skills to win friendships and share the Gospel. Through discipling the new believers, they hope to establish a Christ-centered church that will be run by the nationals.

Another missionary to whom we gave final approval at the Convention was **Michael Folkerts** from Henderson, Neb.'s Faith Evangelical Bible Church. He is serving through Cru (Campus Crusade for Christ) on the campuses of several Nebraska universities.

Michael grew up in a small town close to Henderson. He placed his trust in the Lord through his mother who came to know the Lord through Cru (then Campus Crusade) her sophomore year in college. He always dreamed of being a famous football player or powerful politician making an impact for God's kingdom through public appearances. But failing to make the cut on the University of Nebraska football team and experiencing some other humbling events, "the Lord was clear that he had different plans for my life."

During one Christmas break he attended a Cru winter conference in Denver where he learned about Cru's mission to evangelize and disciple the world through various types of ministries. That was instrumental in drawing Michael to Cru. Cru's campus ministry vision is "that every student on campus will have the opportunity to hear and respond to the gospel of Jesus Christ; that believers will be built up in their faith and grow in their



understanding of God through fellowship and discipleship; and that each student in our campus movements will be equipped to be a life-long laborer for Christ."

After graduating from University of Nebraska in 2010, he interned with Cru on the university's Lincoln, Neb., campus for a year and then interned with the JESUS Film Mission Trips in Orlando, Fla. After his second year of internship, he joined Cru full time with the JESUS Film Media department for almost a year. During this time he helped develop a JESUS Film app for android phones.

Just recently, Michael returned to Nebraska to work with the campus ministry on several college campuses in eastern Nebraska: University of Nebraska in Lincoln, Doane College in Crete and Midlands College in Fremont, with the possibility of adding a few more campuses after the first of the year. This ministry involves evangelism, discipleship, and mentoring the young men on campus. It is Michael's responsibility to coach and disciple the student leaders on each campus. He will also help organize a men's retreat in February and help lead a mission trip to San Diego, Calif., this summer.

Both Michael and Joanne need our prayers and support. Joanne is embarking on a brand new mission career far away from home. There will be times of loneliness and the challenge of learning a new language, new culture and working as a team with relative strangers. Michael is in transition to a new ministry, and each campus has its own culture that he needs to learn. He is also building new relationships with the young men who are already in place as his student leaders.

The Apostle Paul told the Philippians, "I thank my God every time I remember you" (Phil. 1:3 NIV). I thank God for these young people who have a passion to serve God and spread the Gospel to those who have not heard.

Creating Opportunities for Radio Follow-Up

"We don't hand out calendars, we preach the Gospel," was a pastor's reply when we offered him Radio Mensajero's (RM) calendars to distribute in his church and community. Different views, different approaches in evangelism. Nothing new, right? We insist that our mandate and desire is to communicate the Good News in a relevant way; others are more reserved. In radio-follow up we find it essential to work together with local churches to provide them with tools for effective evangelism and discipleship training for new believers; therefore, we continuously look for a common ground, a platform, to combine forces.

In Paraguay, radio is known to be an effective tool for evangelism, especially to connect with listeners and win their trust. To have RM's calendar displayed in a household or a public place visibly affirms: "We like what we're hearing!" Some have saved all calendars for more than 15 years.



If listeners — be they Latino, Mennonite or Aboriginal — feel respected, loved and cared for, they open up to other ministries. Yes, some will reject our programming because of our faith. Others gradually open up to our presence. Some receive Jesus, and RM has helped them in the process.

It takes special holistic programming to win listeners and keep them connected to RM. We meet them at their level, in their world, on their platform. In radio work we assimilate these platforms as we produce programs in which we embrace their interest and touch their personal and family needs. Our love and care for them is also felt when we hand out calendars, distribute Christian magazines, give seminars, provide counselling or do special projects in their community. That builds trust. It opens closed doors.

This story illustrates how various activities work together with media: Flora attended a workshop promoted by her university. The speaker was from Radio Mensajero. Motivated by a promotional sticker, she dialed 100.9 FM. She and her Mom began to listen daily. A few years later Fermina called our office requesting the special calendar we offered. On our next visit we personally delivered the calendar and also shared with her how to be 100 percent sure about spending eternity in



heaven. "That's what I would like to know!" she exclaimed. Right there on the street, Fermina committed her life to Jesus. During another visit, together with Esther, Fermina opened up about a difficult relationship within the family. "I've been hoping to talk with someone for so long," she said. An opportune time for ambulant counselling! Opposition from her traditional church for listening to an evangelical station increased. In spite of it, Fermina later phoned to ask for good materials to teach children in her (traditional) church.

We keep in contact with local pastors, encouraging them to disciple new believers like Fermina. Pray that we will be faithful in proclaiming Jesus through radio, but also wise to know what platforms to use as we join hands with others in the radio follow-up ministry in Paraguay.

An open letter to FEBC women across the continent ...

Dear FEBC Sisters,

Last year's theme for our Commission on Women's Ministries was "Connections." We on the Commission feel that we have begun to have some growing connection with each one of you. Now it's time for *you* to make the connections with each other. We want to encourage you wonderful women to stretch and begin to make connections outside the four walls of your church.

I remember as a young woman when I started to receive invitations to "ladies meetings." There was something the ladies did as a group that they called "Secret Sisters." I think it still goes on, but let me explain for those who are not familiar with it: Someone in the group gathered names and put them on little slips of paper. These usually included birth dates and anniversaries. Those were then put into a box or hat, and each woman drew a name. Those participating promised to pray for that sister and remember her in special secret ways throughout the year. It was always exciting at the end of the year when the real identity of your secret sister was revealed. It was fun, and it encouraged prayer and connection with each other.

The FEBC Commission on Women wants to do something like this on a *grand scale* this year. It would *not* be a secret, though. We would like to partner church women's ministries groups in our Fellowship. These couplings would:

• Figure out a way to introduce themselves to their partner church — maybe a picture; a power point presentation about their group, their town, their church, etc.; a phone call; a Skype date; or a treasure box full of interesting "stuff" from where *they* live that explains who *they* are.

Then ...

 The church group partners would try to set up prayer channels, promising to share needs with each other and pray for each other over the next 12 months. Then ...

• Church group partners would check out the possibilities of sharing the same Bible Study curriculum with the other group and meeting every few weeks for a Skype Bible study. Or they could work on a project together (make a quilt across the miles?) The possibilities are endless!

Then ...

• This is the big one! Where possible, we would like to encourage all the groups, or as many as possible, to meet on one of two designated weekends in the spring for a "Face to Face" encounter. Maybe one could meet at the other's church, or a place in between (a camp for a retreat, or hall in a town midway between the churches). How fun and exciting it would be to hug the lady you have been praying for but never met; to get to know this other group of Christian women you have been connecting with face to face!

I realize that some churches have no other FEBC church nearby, so they will need to be very creative. Maybe they could both do the same event and Skype each other on the big screen for that sense of togetherness. Creativity is not in short supply for women!

We want your input, too. You can contact me via Facebook at W Com Connections to share your ideas.

We will send letters to FEBC churches soon and want to hear from you ASAP so we can begin pairing you up. What a cool way to connect across our continent with prayer and care, because we are *sisters* in Christ.

Let the partnering begin! I look forward to hearing from you soon.

Focus on the Word

Spiritual Warfare By Harvey Schultz

In my previous article in the November/December

issue of Fellowship Focus, we turned our attention to Ephesians 6:12: "For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms." Spiritual warfare doesn't happen only when there is some obvious manifestation of evil powers. We are engaged in spiritual warfare every time we seek to advance God's kingdom. We aren't instructed to "pray against" evil powers in order to be effective. We are called to pray to God. As we do, He binds the forces of evil in heavenly realms, and victories are won on earth.

Daniel spent three weeks in prayer. At the end of that time an angel arrived and assured him that the answer had been sent to him on the *first* day of his prayer vigil, but that the "prince of the Persian kingdom" (an evil angel) resisted him for 21 days. When the angel Michael joined in the fight, the first angel was able to get through to Daniel with the answer (Daniel 10:2-14).

Wow! For 21 days Daniel had wrestled against evil forces in the heavenlies. Was he aware of that? I suspect not. Were his prayers effectual in enabling the angel to come to him? I believe so. In fact, Bible scholars are no doubt right when they say that Daniel's prayers were crucial not only in getting the answer through, but also in causing the Persian Kingdom to be favorable to the Jews in the future.

My wife and I lived and served in a city of France, which, according to the local police chief, was known to the national French Police force as a hotbed of demonism and sexual perversion. We felt the oppression of evil forces day in and day out. It was like a heavy, wet blanket hanging over you, stifling your spiritual vitality.

At one point we gathered together a team of seasoned missionaries and Bible school students to help us conduct a week-long evangelistic blitz which included door-to-door work and evangelistic services in the evenings. The first night of those services was a disaster! The atmosphere was heavy and oppressive. Our speaker, an eloquent French evangelist, stumbled over his words. Later he would say that it seemed like everything he said was thrown back at him. The door-to-door work was tedious and fruitless.

The next morning I cancelled our planned activities, called the team together and announced that we were going to engage in prayer and would not leave that room until the Spirit of the Lord gave us the freedom to do so. Then we went to prayer. We did not pray against any evil forces. Rather, we asked God to open doors, to give our speaker liberty, to give us tangible results, to give us opportunities to share the Gospel, to create interest in people's hearts, to protect us physically, etc.

All at once something changed. Prayers turned to praise. The spirit of heaviness we had felt was gone. In its place there was a sense of spiritual freedom. I brought the prayer meeting to an end, stepped out of the house to pick up the daily mail which was being delivered just then and within seconds was sharing the Gospel with the mailman — something which had never happened before. The door-to-door ministry that day discovered hungry hearts. That evening, the speaker was once again the eloquent French evangelist we had known. His message was powerful.

However, a nurse who had been studying the Bible with us did not attend the meeting that night. We were disappointed. We had prayed so much for her salvation. The next morning I took extra time to pray for her. But the Spirit of God would not allow me to pray. Instead, He overwhelmed me with a spirit of praise and with a deep inner conviction that the battle had been won. She

did show up that evening and grabbed my arm as I greeted her, exclaiming: "It's done!" I replied simply: "I know." "How?" she wanted to know. "The Spirit told me," was my reply. Today, she is still walking with the Lord and serving Him at her husband's side.

All at once something changed. Prayers turned to praise. The spirit of heaviness we had felt was gone. In its place there was a sense of spiritual freedom.

There were more such experiences. All of them left us in awe as we saw God at work in answer to persevering, faithful prayer. It was always obvious that battles had been won in the invisible world. While I don't recall that we ever "prayed against" evil forces, I do recall that we were very conscious that we were in a spiritual battle. We also recall that on several occasions the Lord gave us inner assurance of victories weeks and, sometimes, months before we actually saw the answer. His Spirit witnessed to our spirit that the victory had been won and that we were to praise Him for the victory.

"And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests ... always keep on praying ..." (Ephesians 6:18)

To this day we remain convinced that we are always engaged in spiritual warfare every time we seek to advance the kingdom of God. The spiritual forces of evil must be defeated if we want to see victory. Only persevering, united prayer addressed to God in faith will accomplish that.

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Catch the Vision

Sowing seeds at 30,000 feet By Arielle Berg

Last year I planned a trip to visit relatives in Seattle. I was in my first year of teaching middle school, and the trip was a short, but much-needed break and change of scenery in the normal routine of the school year.

I knew that on a trek across U.S. skies God would undoubtedly provide several opportunities to converse with fellow travelers. On the flight from Denver to Seattle, I sat next to a middle-aged businessman whom I will call "Jim." I learned that Jim regularly made trips from Omaha to the West Coast in his position as a high-ranking manager within an information technology company.

To be honest, I felt rather intimidated striking up a conversation at first. I am not naturally an evangelist and must intentionally turn conversations to faith and to Christ. I felt like a meek Midwestern school teacher next to a corporation giant, but Jim proved to be very friendly, and said that I reminded him of one of his children. We traded stories about life at home, families, and the stark differences between the Midwest and the West Coast. As we discussed the flight, I remarked that flying takes a lot of trust in the pilot, using my statement to transition into a discussion about spiritual life.

Jim began to express his opinions about faith. He referred to his brother, a priest with whom he had agreed to disagree. He loved his brother, he said, but the subject of faith was something they disagreed too strongly on. All religions had their own good ways to get to God, Jim said.

Knowing that many business people tend towards intellectualism, I shared how my faith had been strengthened by the worldview and apologetics courses I had taken at the Christian schools I attended. I had come to see that not only was my faith real, but that it made sense, standing up when all other worldviews crumbled.

Although my fellow passenger was open to discussion, I could tell that he was using the cheerful confidence he had in himself as a kind of guard or barrier against really examining Christianity. He'd had this talk with Christians before and was prepared to politely disagree.

Toward the end of our conversation, I asked Jim why he wouldn't want to be sure of where he would spend eternity. He responded that while he appreciated my concern, he was just fine with where he was spiritually.

As our flight approached Seattle, I could tell that Jim had enjoyed our conversation, and that I had at least won his respect by simply sharing my faith without pushing. It gave me a fresh realization that my attitude and tone are important aids to the message I have to share.

Even as we went our separate ways in the terminal, Jim waved goodbye to me.

All religions had their own good ways to get to God, said my fellow passenger.

Along with discovering from this encounter that an outward appearance of confidence may be used as a smokescreen, I was also reminded that we may not see that the Holy Spirit is working in a heart, even after we are long gone. I first learned that while traveling in Asia with a team of university students. I had the opportunity to share my testimony of God's work in my life with an Asian friend. At that time, I couldn't see that my story had made any impression on her. It was not until a year later that one of my teammates contacted me, sharing that my Asian friend had asked her about Jesus over Skype.

I had planted the seed. My former teammate had watered it. I hadn't seen any evidence of conviction or change right away. I had no idea that my story had impacted her and that she would respond later.

But whether sharing in Asia or at 30,000 feet over the United States, my responsibility is to share and to pray for the Holy Spirit to do His work, in His way and His time.
