



Leadership Education Seminar Offers Solutions to Stress of Church Board Service

How does one deal with the pressures of serving on a church board with integrity, grace, and in a way that promotes unity? How does one address the conflict that arises from different visions, yet joyfully serve the congregation? How can a church board member be disciplined, or discipled? And what do we learn from the statistics of burn out and depression among ministry families?

Dr. Paul Magnus, former president of Briercrest Family of Schools, explored these and other issues at "Developing and Transforming the Church Board," the leadership education seminar featured

at the recent FEBC Workshop at Langham Evangelical Bible Church, Langham, Sask. Using Ephesians, 1 Timothy, Exodus 18 and portions of Acts, Dr. Magnus taught about boundaries that empower (limitations without mini-management), duties of a board and its relationship to others, evaluating boards, discipleship within boards, and conflict. The 32 people attending appreciated his presentation on how to have crucial conversations when the stakes are high, opinions vary, and


emotions are strong. The last session dealt with conflict resolution, bringing discussions to decisions, and giving clarity to expectations.

Dr. Magnus brought to bear the psychology behind conflict and motivation, using diagrams that helped us to see the connection between responsibility, accountability and relationships. He urged us to make our churches safe enough to talk about issues, rather than avoid them or engage in controlling behaviors.

Dr. Magnus challenged boards to be a pastor to the Pastor, to care deeply and well for the

shepherding families. Leadership is a noble thing, demanding character, spirituality, wholeness and modeling at home. Will we accept the challenge?

Learning to Evaluate the Emerging Church Movement

In the last issue, I pointed out that, among other things, the movement is a reaction to perceived weaknesses of evangelical churches. What are these perceptions to which emergents are reacting? Are they true of my (your) church?

Some of these are:

- Too much emphasis on the "hereafter" and not enough on the here and now.
- Too much emphasis on correct doctrine and not enough on relationships
- Too great a tendency to "dissect" and analyse the Bible without being transformed by it
- Too much emphasis on rationalism and not enough on mysticism
- Too many Christians want to live in the Christian "ghetto" and not be salt and light in the world
- Too often church worship services are "shallow," entertainment oriented, and one-dimensional (people are spectators, not participants)
- Too much emphasis on fear-motivated Christianity ("do this or ...").

What are the movement's tendencies and practices?

Knowing what the perceived weaknesses are helps us understand what emergents are attempting to do. They are engaging in practices which will, in their opinion, overcome these flaws. They say that their desire is to experience God rather than merely know about Him.

Services are often very laid back. Participation by all is encouraged. Rational analysis is out. Feelings and sensations are in. Structure is out. Different groups may be doing different things throughout the auditorium at one and the same time.

People are encouraged to engage in practices many of us knew nothing about. "Lectio divina" is promoted — a way of reading Scripture without using your

head. Read from the "heart." Don't seek information. Don't seek to critically analyse a passage. Let it speak to your heart.

The use of "labyrinths" is promoted. This is not a maze but a "path" in a three-stage journey which begins with (1) purgation (entering into the labyrinth), and continues with (2) illumination (reaching the center where your mind is emptied) and ends with (3) exiting the labyrinth totally absorbed by what has been given to you in the illumination stage.

"Journaling," another practice which is promoted, does not refer to merely writing down what happens to you day after day. It is spending time in silence, asking God to speak to you and writing down whatever comes to your mind. Some go so far as to say that God is actually dictating what they are writing down.

Many in the movement strongly promote mysticism, which has been defined as the belief that there can be an unmediated encounter with God. Contemplative prayer is practiced where you reach God through solitude, not through Jesus Christ. Some disdain, and at times, even deny the necessity of rational understanding and seek truth instead through feelings, dreams, visions and extrasensory perceptions.

There is a strong emphasis on the "here and now" as opposed to the "hereafter." Getting to heaven is not nearly as important as getting heaven to earth now. Whole churches are devoting themselves to the pursuit of social justice causes, such as endorsing and embracing the "green" causes. For some it is clear that the Church's business is mainly political. They believe we are called to usher in the Kingdom of God on earth.

What are the dangers and weaknesses of the movement?

• View of Scripture: It is increasingly being viewed as a human product with mistakes. Traditional terms like revelation, infallible, inerrant, absolute truth are shunned. Emergents question the importance of doctrine which is viewed as mere expressions of logic and which, they say, leads to exclusivism.

- The "knowability" of God is undermined: We can know *about* God but we can't really *know* Him since He is infinite, they say.
- View of the atonement: Christ's death for sins is repugnant to some and labelled as a case of "cosmic child abuse"! Instead of atoning for our sins, His death is a moral example of God's love for us.
- A false dichotomy: Information vs. transformation; doctrine vs. relationships; experiential worship vs. renewing the mind; rationality vs. faith; head vs. heart. (We believe that there need not be a wedge between rationality and faith, or truth and experience.)
- Tolerance: As postmoderns, they hesitate to brand anything as wrong. They usually don't condemn homosexuality, but stress the need for loving relationships with homosexuals. (However, true tolerance says you have your right to your opinion, and I will fight to defend your right, even though you are wrong).
- Universalism and inclusivism: A number of emergents can't imagine that God would send anyone to hell. Universalism states that in the end, everyone will be saved. You don't need to know what Christ taught to be a Christ-follower. Inclusivism reaches out to people of all faiths *including* the non-Christian eastern faiths.
- Practices which can lead the unwary into occultism: Some of these are lectio divina, labyrinths, journaling, mysticism and centering prayer where you repeat the same phrase over and over, hundreds of times (any practice which leads to the emptying of the mind has been used for centuries as an entry point for the occult).
- Redefinition of missions: Increasingly missions has become a question of social compassion, not conversion.

- No spiritual compass for the young generation: When the words of the Bible take on meanings that are constantly shifting, depending on who is reading it, where is the spiritual compass for the next generation? Mainline churches which don't have sure answers have been losing out for decades.
- Increasing attraction to the Eucharist: The return to mysticism is creating an increased attraction to the catholic Eucharist in which the bread and wine of communion are said to be transformed into the very body and blood of Jesus Christ with the (mystical) power to convey salvation to the participants. Today the Roman Catholic Church is promoting a "New Evangelization" program using the Eucharistic Jesus. Emergents are showing a growing interest/attraction to this practice (cf. Hebrews 9:28.)

A framework for evaluation

It has not been the goal of these articles to ferret out and analyse all the teachings of those who might be considered emergents. Rather, it has been my goal to present a framework each reader can use to do his own evaluation of the movement and its various proponents. Books written by emergent authors should be read carefully and discerningly. Everything should be sifted through the grid of Scripture. Most likely it would be very unwise to use the writings and study materials of emergent authors for Bible study groups. And I strongly encourage each one to read one or more of the following books to gain a more accurate and thorough understanding of this movement: "Why We're Not Emergent" by Kevin DeYoung and Ted Kluck, and "Becoming Conversant with the Emerging Church" by D. A. Carson.

Answered Prayer Brings a Pastor to Valley Bible

Valley Bible Fellowship of Morris, Man., welcomed **Pastor Ryan and Uma Rear** on Jan. 1. The search for a full-time pastor was a lengthy process. We were blessed with many great speakers including **Myron Henschel** as interim pastor, and **Glenn Krobel**, who served as part-time pastor for two years until March 2009. We started searching for a full-time pastor again in May 2009.

Because our congregation is small and aging, we felt that if a suitable candidate did not apply by the end of 2009, we would consider closing our church. But God is faithful! He answered our prayers when Pastor Ryan applied for the position in September. The elders met with him several times before asking Pastor Ryan and his family to preach and

meet the congregation in October. A few weeks passed, with the congregation praying for God's leading, and Ryan and Uma accepted the call to Valley Bible.

An installation service was held Feb. 14, with several pastors and Christian leaders bringing greetings and encouraging words. Pastor James Thiessen from Hodgson Bible Church, our sister church in Hodgson, Man., brought the message, and gave Pastor Ryan and the congregation the challenge to reach into the community and be witnesses in all areas of life.

Pastor Ryan and Uma met while working with physically and mentally challenged people in Edmonton, Alta. They felt called to church ministry, and Pastor Ryan began studying at Taylor Seminary in Edmonton in 1997.

After graduating from seminary, the couple served for five years at a Korean Baptist Church in Edmonton, working with youth and young adults. In 2004, they accepted a new position in Manitoba, serving at the Roblin and Grandview Free Methodist churches for more than three years. Following that, they moved to the Interlake region, ministering most recently at the Moosehorn Baptist Church in a six-month interim position.

The Rears are parents to Cassandra, 14, and Samuel, 13.

"As a family, we are thrilled to be in Morris serving in Valley Bible Fellowship Church," Pastor Ryan said. "Our new church has great people, and Morris is a great community. We are grateful to be here."

Meet the New FEBC President



For the first time in 121 years, the Fellowship has a full-time president! Rev. Blaine Donaldson began his duties on May 1. Blaine is not new to the FEBC, having served as pastor of the Randville Bible Church, and on the Commission on Education and the Executive Committee. More recently, Blaine, his wife, Autumn, and their two children have been living in Felch, Mich., where he pastored the Felch Mountain Bible Chapel. The family is now making their new home in Omaha.

Blaine Donaldson was born in Lac La Biche, Alta., on Sept. 5, 1968. His father taught school and his mother was a nurse. The family moved home to Nova Scotia in 1970. Blaine's parents had a small farm, where he milked the family cow before and after school and helped with various chores. Blaine became an avid hockey player, and from the age of five, he loved to work with computers.

Although Blaine had a strong Christian heritage from his grandfather and great-grandfather, he did not grow up in a Christian home. His parents were kind, consistent, and excellent providers, but they had no involvement with the Lord or with church. In 1985, Blaine started attending a church with some friends. There he came to understand that Jesus died for his sins, and after some time, Blaine believed on Jesus as his Lord and Savior

After graduating from high school, Blaine attended Mount Allison University in Sackville, New Brunswick. He was working on a bachelor of science, majoring in math and physics, when the Lord indicated that He had other plans for Blaine. Between his sophomore and junior years, Blaine worked two full-time jobs. At the end of the summer, during an evening service at his home church, the Lord clearly called him into ministry. Blaine said, "I did not hear a voice — it was louder than that." He finished his third year at Mount Allison, then left to attend Briercrest Bible College.

It was at Briercrest that he met Autumn Jewel Brown of Langham, Sask. They were married on May 5, 1991. That summer, Blaine and Autumn worked with Friendship Ministries in Calgary, Alta., teaching English as a second language (TESL) to Arab immigrants. They also worked with an Arabic-speaking church, visiting Arabic homes in order to witness about Jesus and introduce them to an Arabic-speaking church. This mission internship was an exciting time of ministry for Blaine and Autumn. They continue to have a warm place in their hearts for the Arab people.

Blaine graduated from Briercrest in 1993 with a bachelor of arts in Bible, and a minor in Pastoral Studies. Blaine's home church in Nova Scotia called him to be associate pastor, and he served until 1995. Senior Pastor Ches MacKenzie mentored Blaine in pastoral ministry, and this had a profound effect on him. Blaine does not believe that he would still be in the ministry without Pastor MacKenzie's influence.

In 1995, the Lord called Blaine to serve at Randville Bible Church, near Iron Mountain, Mich. He served there until 2008. Blaine also served at Felch Mountain Bible Chapel, a Baptist church, for the past eight years (2002-2010).

"I was very happy as a pastor in the church at Felch," Blaine said. "Through various circumstances, the Lord opened the door to this position. I am confident that this is the Lord's will, and I am growing in anticipation as to what He is going to do through it."

As the FEBC's new president, Blaine will communicate the vision of our Fellowship to our churches, and convey their ideas and concerns to the Executive Committee. "My goal is to fully embrace the 20/20 vision, which will be formally presented at the 2010 Convention," he said. "I hope to be a catalyst for the Fellowship to implement this vision, and to develop consistent, consequential, caring relationships with the pastors of the FEBC and, as much as possible, with their leadership. As these relationships develop, I hope to develop more significant interest and passion for the greater FEBC ministry."

Blaine and Autumn have two children: Adrianna, 14, and Anthony, 7. Autumn enjoys being a full-time homemaker and serving the Lord alongside Blaine. Blaine still likes to work with computers and technology, although recently he developed an enjoyment of hunting and fishing with his family.

"Prayer and Projects" Connects Fellowship Women with Missionary Sisters

Have you ever received a letter asking if you need money for a special project? Have you ever received a letter asking you to share a personal prayer need? That is what happens every year to our FEBC women missionaries. So what's that all about?

Well, let me back up a little bit. It is the desire of the Commission on Women's Ministries to promote spiritual fellowship and growth among the 44 women's ministries groups in the Fellowship with our focus being to:

"... consider how to stimulate one another to love and good deeds encouraging one another."

Hebrews 10:24, 25

Each year, letters are sent to our FEBC missionaries asking them for a prayer request and a project for which our women's ministry groups could pray and contribute. Our goal is to connect each women's group in the Fellowship with a specific missionary with whom they can

correspond, pray for, and also help with a need or project that would take money to complete. Because we have 90 some missionaries, we divide the list into two parts and help half one year and the other half the next year.

It is exciting to see the variety of requests that we receive, and some of the prayer requests are so full of longing for their peoples to know Christ. After we have compiled the list of missionaries who wish to participate and their requests, we send this list to each of the churches' women's ministries. We request they share this list with their particular group and choose one of the missionaries to be their project. We ask they send their choice to Sharon Skillman (Evangelical Mennonite Brethren Church, Lustre, Mont.), project coordinator. She then creates a board with each missionary's name, their mission, the prayer request and the project request which will be displayed at Convention in July. The churches who have contacted Sharon earlier will already be on the board, and there is specific room for the many other churches to sign-up then for their choice. Then it is their responsibility to correspond with the missionary, help in her project request (up to \$100) and pray for her.

We are excited again this year for the contact and bonding that comes from the Prayer and Projects effort. It is our desire that all our missionaries will respond to the letter, and all of our women's groups will encourage one another in support of our missionary sisters.



Omaha's Community Bible Church Welcomes Convention-goers

With a new vision and a new full-time president for the Fellowship, our 116th annual convention in July promises to be unique. Here's what you need to know if you go ...

Community Bible Church has the privilege of hosting the Fellowship of Evangelical Bible Churches Annual Convention, July 15-18. Committee chairs have been appointed and are at work. The CBC congregation looks forward to welcoming 150-200 delegates, missionaries, young people and families from across the Midwest and Canada. The Commission on Missions has selected the convention theme "Every Tribe, Tongue, People and Nation" (Revelation 5:9B), a theme that will be explored by guest speaker Dr. Roger Peugh of Grace Theological Seminary, Winona Lake, Ind.

This convention will also be unique in that we will welcome the first ever, full-time president of our Fellowship, Blaine Donaldson (see p. 6). He was hired by the executive under mandate from the delegates at the 2009 convention. The matter of "Clarifying our 20/20 Vision" will be central to much of the time devoted to convention business.

What's planned for children and youth?

The children will enjoy taking nature hikes and learning through various science experiments as they study what the Bible has to say about what God created. They'll also swim, create sand sculptures, fish, and visit the world-class Henry Doorly Zoo!

"Youth in the Wild" is the theme for the youth retreat at Camp of the Good Shepherd near Louisville, Neb. How has God used the wilderness, whether literal or metaphorical, in the lives of His followers to move them on to greater things and a closer relationship with Him? Dave Foster, pastor of Family Ministries at Parkview Church of Iowa City, Iowa, is guest speaker for the youth.

What's the convention schedule?

The FEBC is led by an executive committee which repre-

sents the seven commissions (committees). The Fellowship will be installing its first ever full-time president. The commissions will arrive on Wednesday evening and be in session all day on Thursday. The convention itself begins with an evening service on Thursday; the last business session is Saturday afternoon.

Host home or hotel?

We pray that our welcome will include sunny days with moderate temperatures. We know we can provide a warm welcome to our church and to a number of host homes for those who prefer that option to a hotel. You can also look forward to delightful meals, prepared on site.

How much are registration fees?

Registration fees will be the same for folks from both sides of the border this year: \$90 for adults, \$80 for missionaries, \$30 for children, and \$115 for the youth going to Camp of the Good Shepherd. There is an additional late registration fee after June 15.

What else is there to do and see?

There are many opportunities for extending your stay to experience some of the entertainment and delights of our city. Golfers may be interested in one of our 42 golf courses. Reaching Those Who Cannot Read

How can the Church reach the world with the Scriptures, and information that explains the Scriptures, when 70 percent of the people either cannot, will not or do not read?

Ben Watson served as pastor of the Randville Bible Church in Michigan, and on the commissions on education and churches, and the FEBC Heartland Extension Committee. He presently is supervisor of Alternative Media at the Source of Light headquarters in Madison, Ga.

How can the Church reach the world with the Scriptures, and information that explains the Scriptures, when 70 percent of the people either cannot, will not or do not read? Source of Light Ministries International has a plan that I believe will excite you and invite your involvement.

What is Source of Light Ministries International (SLM)?

Source of Light is an independent faith mission that exists to bring people of every nation, language and ethnicity into a mature relationship with Jesus Christ and into fellowship with a local church.

SLM is a worldwide, disciple-making, church-planting mobilization that uses the medium of Bible lessons for all ages in both printed and electronic format to achieve its goals. Lessons are distributed throughout the world by the International Headquarters in Madison, Ga., and its Discipleship Training Branches and Associate Discipleship Schools.

What is the Alternative Media ministry?

It is that part of the total ministry of SLM that places the Bible courses into media in addition to print. Our media include large print, Braille, and audio and computer-based applications, including online courses and live webinars.

Our purpose is to make studying God's Word possible to everyone, regardless of their level of literacy, geographical location or physical limitations.

It is our audio ministry that the Commission on Missions has selected for the 2010 Convention Project. Since its beginning in 1952, SLM has been a print-based publishing ministry. In recent years, however, we have become aware that most of the world's population either can't, don't or won't read a printed book. We've also become aware that these people can be reached by a digital, solid-state, solar-powered audio player called the Papyrus Audio Player. This player has several features that make it ideal for any person who cannot read print media.

- The Papyrus Solar Player fits easily into a pocket or purse.
- The rear solar panel allows the sun or even artificial light to

charge the battery for up to eight hours of playing time.

- Groups as large as 200 can hear the message through the built-in speaker.
- An oral learner or a visually-impaired person can easily navigate from one program to another.
- It is secure. The user cannot change the messages that have been placed in it.
- Users can listen from either the 1GB internal memory or an optional removable SD card of any size. For example, Scripture could be on the internal memory and Bible studies on the SD card.

How does Source of Light plan to use the players?

In the pilot project, 100 Christian leaders from Ethiopia will be trained to teach with the players. Over a one-year period,

their ministry will be to take the players to non-reading groups of people. They will play the lessons, and then discuss the lessons, receiving feedback similar to what we receive in our printed lessons. At the end of the year, someone from SLM will meet with those leaders in Ethiopia to assess the min-



istry and determine how to proceed, both in Ethiopia and throughout the rest of our fields. If it is as successful in Ethiopia as we believe it will be, we plan to utilize these on all of our fields.

Projected (but not final) costs:

- Players: \$50.00 per player total for 100 players = \$5000
- Training and Evaluation by SLM personnel = \$7,500
- Total MegaVoice Project = \$12,500

As you pray about your part in this year's convention project, know that many people who would never be able to read a Source of Light Bible lesson will now be able to hear them, and because they hear, they will trust Jesus Christ as their Savior and grow into maturity. In this the Scripture will again be fulfilled, "So then faith [comes] by hearing, and hearing by the word of God" (Romans 10:17 KJV).

Welcome to Community Bible Church

In the early 60's several families met in a home in southwest Omaha with a God-given determination to see an evangelical witness rise as rapidly as the population of the area. Three of these families included brothers who also shared a successful development and construction company. They offered a three acre plot to this small body of believers. In 1962 a house was built on this plot to temporarily serve as a church building.

Not all of their aspirations were realized and by 1964 several families had moved away including the pastor. When the Philips Petroleum Co. offered to buy the property, the board decided to sell, but the city refused to re-zone the property for commercial use. God had other plans!

In 1968 Dr. Harold Burkholder was called to serve as part-time pastor. Under his ministry the church grew, and in 1969 plans for a new church building were approved. The church grew in size during Dr. Burkholder's ministry, who resigned in 1973 to make way for a full-time pastor.

Two pastors served until the coming of Dr. Roger Andrus in 1976. In 1980, under his leadership, the church embarked upon a building addition that included the gym, church offices and main lobby. Dr. Andrus retired May 1982, and Douglas Hornok was called to serve as pastor. Rev. Hornok pastored the flock until January 1990. In February 1990, Charles Tschetter became Senior Pastor.

In 1997 the CE addition was added west of the worship center, providing overflow seating, classrooms and enhanced nursery facilities. The sanctuary and kitchen were remodeled in 2004 and 2005.

We thank God for His rich blessings through the past four decades and believe that He desires to continue to use us as we remain faithful and obedient to Him.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Our Savior is good! These are exciting times for the FEBC. It is my pleasure to invite you to gather together as a Fellowship at Convention 2010: Clarifying our 20/20 Vision, in Omaha, July 15-18.

The Lord is revealing His plan for us for the next decade. Through the input of many of our churches, the diligent work of the Vision Committee, and the unanimous confirmation of the FEBC Executive, the Lord has issued a visionary call to return to the founding principles and identity of our Fellowship.

As a Fellowship, we have many strengths: we have a strong commitment to the authority of God's Word; we believe God can and will change us to be like Jesus in the way that we live; and we desire to take the gospel around the world through missions. We have a strong heritage, yet our vision for the next ten years must not focus on our strengths, but on overcoming our weaknesses.

We are at an important crossroads in our Fellowship's history: I encourage as many of you as possible to join us in the formal presentation of this renewed vision. We believe that the Lord is calling us follow this vision, and we are excited about what He is going to do. Come see firsthand where the Lord is leading us. Come hear His voice calling you to embrace this vision.

There will be many changes necessary in order to implement this vision. This next year, the Executive will be communicating, listening and planning for these changes. However, there will be no constitutional changes or major financial changes at Convention 2010. Our focus will be on introducing, explaining, and discussing the vision. At the end of the discussion, we will hold a vote regarding the essence of the vision. Guaranteed Payments for Life: The Charitable Gift Annuity

The gift annuity is an arrangement under which you make a contribution to the Fellowship of Evangelical Bible Churches and receive, in turn, guaranteed payments for life. It's a way of giving that allows you to make a substantial gift even though you may need ongoing income from your assets.

What are the Benefits?

In addition to guaranteed payments, a charitable gift annuity provides other benefits, including:

- A portion of the payment is tax-free.
- Charitable deduction in the year of the gift
- An annuity rate often higher than the interest paid on current fixed investments
- Capital gains tax savings on appreciated assets
- Satisfaction of assisting the FEBC in its mission

How Does it Work?

Most charitable gift annuities are funded with cash or listed securities. When you contribute securities, the annuity payments will probably exceed the dividends you were receiving.

The Fellowship invests and manages your contribution, and at the end of your life the remainder is available to the Fellowship for present or future work.

The amount of the annual payments will depend on the amount transferred, the ages of the beneficiary(ies), and the annuity rate schedule in effect at the time of the gift. Once the annuity is established, the payments will remain fixed, regardless of changes in the economy. The security of fixed, guaranteed payments makes the gift annuity an especially attractive option.

What About Taxes?

The most notable tax benefit of a gift annuity is the chari-

table deduction in the year of the gift. The amount of the deduction depends on the rates in effect and on the age(s) of the annuitant(s) at the time the annuity is established. An additional benefit occurs when appreciated securities are contributed. Capital gains tax is avoided on the part of the property that is considered a gift. The rest of the capital gain (assuming the donor is one of the beneficiaries) will be recognized over a period of years, spreading out payment of the capital gains tax. Consider the following examples (actual interest rates may differ):

Peter and Norma M, both aged 75, contribute \$10,000 cash to our organization for a gift annuity, naming themselves as the beneficiaries. As long as either of them lives, they will receive payments of \$600 per year (an annuity rate of 6.0%). For the duration of their life expectancy, \$388.80 of their annual payments will be tax-free. They will also receive a charitable deduction of \$3,624.64(based on a federal discount rate of 4.2%).

Mildred R, who is 80 years old, contributes \$20,000 of securities (with an original cost of \$8,000) to charity for a gift annuity. With an annuity rate of 7.6%, she receives fixed, guaranteed payments of \$1,520 per year as long as she lives. For the duration of her life, \$428.35 of her annual payments will be tax-free, and \$643.25 of them will be taxed as capital gain. She also receives a charitable deduction of \$9,922.40 (based on a federal discount rate of 4.2%).

Gift annuities are a popular vehicle, allowing people the opportunity to simultaneously make a gift and provide for their future financial security. Welcome, Mr. President

Blaine Donaldson has accepted the position of president for our Fellowship and began May 1. He will be the first full-time president and the first paid president since the position was established in 1948. (See introduction on page 6).

For years, many on the Executive Committee, on the commissions and in local churches have seen a need for someone to keep in closer touch with our pastors and churches, but our financial position always ruled this out. Last summer the delegates of the 30 churches represented voted to establish this position. For this year, the position will be funded through gifts to the President Fund. To date, \$5,200 has been given to the President Fund. For next year, the president will be funded through the budget, but this will still require an increase in church and individual giving.

Christian Ministry Scholarships

College students considering careers in Christian ministry may apply for a scholarship of \$1,000 from the Fellowship. Request information and application forms from orders@febcministries.org. Deadline to submit scholarship applications is May 31.

What does a Fellowship do?

When our churches first banded together in 1889, some of their key purposes were to encourage each other, to promote doctrinal fidelity, to work together in missions/evangelism efforts and to build up each other through training and annual conventions. Soon the evangelism efforts resulted in new churches, and in many cases the Fellowship helped the new churches purchase land and buildings.

Today the Fellowship holds title either solely or jointly to more than \$3.4 million of property used rent-free by our churches (and a camp). In addition, the Fellowship has either loaned money directly or co-signed for loans for many of our churches.

Another function of the Fellowship has been to credential (that is, to license or ordain) clergy serving in our churches or with mission agencies. The Commission on Churches provides churches with a pastoral search kit to help the church determine what kind of pastor it needs. The Commission screens candidates for doctrinal fit with our churches and Fellowship. The Commission advises the church of any doctrinal red flags, but the church decides whether it will hire the candidate. The Commission also assists the local church in holding an ordination council.

The Fellowship coordinates the volunteers who minister to churches, missionaries, Women's Ministry groups, and youth.

Since its beginning, the annual convention has been a key program of the Fellowship. Initially and for many years, a committee was appointed each year just to plan the annual convention. More than a business meeting, the convention was a time to connect with churches and friends, a time to minister God's Word, a time to train workers in the local churches. As far back as 1911 the Conference included a one-day "Sunday School Convention" and a youth program.

Pooled resources are also a characteristic of the Fellowship. Funds from individuals, bequests and churches have been pooled to fund scholarships, pastor care, mission projects, relief efforts and church planting. Each church becomes a partner in these projects. Some churches receive a direct benefit while all churches enjoy a larger ministry through these projects. As early as 1912, our Fellowship purchased land and a building in Chicago for a "mission house."

As a member of a church in our Fellowship, you have a role beyond your local church in building up other believers and churches, turning new people to Christ and training people for ministry. Thank you!

A Few Good Women and Men

Volunteers from your church and other churches make our Fellowship work. This summer 36 people are needed be elected to one of the commissions. If you are interested in serving on a commission, or want more information, talk to your pastor or email info@febcministries.org. Qualified people are nominated by their churches, and then selected by vote at the annual convention.

20/20 Vision

As a result of last summer's roundtable discussions, a Vision Team was formed to analyze the Fellowship and try to determine what our Fellowship should look like in A.D. 2020. The Vision Team has met numerous times in person and through on-line meetings. They presented their 20/20 Vision to the Executive Committee in April, and will present it to the Fellowship at the annual convention in July.

Coming Soon to Your Church

A delegation from the Executive Committee hopes to visit your church soon. This is part of the task to develop a new vision for the Fellowship. The Executive Committee wants to hear what churches see as greatest importance in a Fellowship relationship. Harvey Schultz and Paul Boeker have already met with 24 of our 42 churches.

EYES ON THE WORLD

How would you like to say good-bye to family and friends, sell your home and its contents, get a variety of shots for deadly diseases and take off for a land that has a completely different culture and where people speak a language unlike yours? At least 50 FEBC individuals and families are living this kind of life today.

Pack your bags, and let's visit the largest country in South America. It is the fifth largest both by area and population *in the world!* The coastline is 4,655 miles long (7491 kilometers). Its economy is the eighth largest in the world. The most popular sport there is *futebol* (soccer). You will know where you are when you land and hear the people speaking — not Spanish, but Portuguese — the only country in the Americas to do so. Yes, this large country of South America is Brazil. In A.D. 1500 Portugal claimed this area; thus the language and culture reflect that connection to this day.

Ivan and Elwyn Goossen are brothers who grew up in Brazil, along with brothers Joe and James. All four returned there as missionaries (Avant Ministries), although Joe and family have now moved on to Asia. **Ivan and Mary Goossen** raised their family of four in Fortaleza. The youngest two remain at home. Ivan is field director and Mary runs the guest house. As soon as a new couple arrives to manage the guest house, Ivan and Mary will be free to move to a locale within the radio outreach to participate in that church planting effort.

Elwyn and Linda Goossen (both are second-generation missionaries) and their three children live in the interior, about six hours by bus from Fortaleza in northeast Brazil. They maintain and manage radio stations AM 780 and FM 103.3, tools to help in the *real* work of Avant in northeast Brazil — planting churches. Radio is being used to spread the "Good News" of Jesus, and thus start the growing seeds that develop into new Christians. As believers multiply, the Avant church-planting teams move in to help establish local congregations with local pastors and biblical teaching.

Ken and Lori Stucky (Brazil Gospel Fellowship) live in Mossoro, a town about half the size of Omaha, Neb., located four hours from Fortaleza. Along with Ken's father and brother, they help minister in Christ is Life Church and manage Alpha Christian School, known in Brazil for its excellence in education. Their oldest daughter teaches English part-time and is considered a third-generation missionary. Eric Townsend (from Hebron Bible Church), is spending six months with the Stucky families as he continues his graduate work in counseling at

Grace University. Eric received an FEBC mission grant to help with this assignment.

Scott and Patsy Buhler and their family of three work in a camp ministry with Teach Beyond (formerly Janz Team). They are directors of Quest, a Christian camp and training center. The Buhlers focus on evangelism and leadership training through camps, retreats and leadership seminars. Day-camps and working with businesses is also part of their strategy to reach the community. The Buhlers live in southern Brazil, far from the Goossen and Stucky families in northeastern Brazil.

Far from the bustling large cities of Brazil live a group of missionaries dedicated to Bible translation in the Nambikuára territory of west central Brazil. About 80 years ago this violent tribe killed the first missionaries. Today they have the Word of God in their hands, partially due to the work of **Menno and Barb Kroeker** (Wycliffe). The New Testament was distributed in 1993. MegaVoice audio players with the New Testament were left in all the villages in 2007. In 2009 the Kroekers returned to the villages to distribute a new set of audio players. The work has been dangerous, difficult and discouraging, but it has produced churches scattered among the villages. http://www.sil.org/americas/brasil/IndGrps/ENGLNBST.HTM

Focus on FEBC Church Planting

News and updates on our church plants and their pastors

Humboldt Bible Church, Humboldt, Sask. Ed and Susan Fischer

When the Fischers arrived in 2005 membership was down to six. There were no local elders. Recently seven people joined the church, bringing total membership to 20. Now there are two elders with a third one in training. Ed has resigned and will move by the end of summer. Please pray as we search for a new pastor. It is our hope that after the installation of a new pastor, the church will be able to carry on as a fully autonomous church. Praise the Lord! On June 5 representatives from the other FEBC churches in Saskatchewan plan to converge on Humboldt for a roofing bee, as the shingles need to be replaced.

Community Bible Church, Tisdale, Sask. Brian and Linda Friesen

Attendance has increased significantly in the past six months and has been pushing past the 50 mark. The Lord keeps bringing additional people into the group — either newly-arrived believers or new contacts. The small auditorium is often full, and a solution addressing space problems must be found. Pray not only for a solution to the cramped quarters, but also that more of the newcomers would be willing to assume full responsibility for "their" church through service, membership and generous giving.

Community Bible Church, Indian Head, Sask. Bill and Sandra Glasspell

This church is no longer receiving financial subsidies and would be fully autonomous were it not for the fact that it has only one local elder. Pray for additional men who are committed to Christ, growing in their Christian walk and willing to serve. Pray also for the financial challenge the group faces as they seek to assume full financial responsibility. The church's new website has received hundreds of "hits".

Richer Fellowship Church, Richer, Man. Simon Cheung

Simon's perseverance in identifying with the community has made the church much more visible in the town. The "Financial Peace University" series has further enhanced that visibility, and some additional people have started attending this year. Financially the group has climbed out of a hole and their bank balance is showing slow but steady signs of improvement. Pray for the salvation of local people who would then "join up" with this church.

Hebron Bible Church, Hebron, Neb. Jeff and Wendy Friesen

As of May 31, this church will no longer receive subsidies from the FEBC. They are not a large group (average 35 - 40) but fortunately, they own their own building debt free. They have opened a coffee shop/bakery to subsidize their own salary. Pray for stamina for them and for visible results due to their ministry.

Community Bible Fellowship, Tahlequah, Okla.

Since November 2009, the church has been without a pastor. Attendance has remained constant. A pastoral search is underway. Please pray that the man of the Lord's choosing to shepherd this flock will be found soon, and that he will lead it to full autonomy.
