

Taking Advantage of Postmodernism

"It used to be that people had morals. They went to church and learned right from wrong," was the comment overheard at a local coffee shop.

"If we could just get people to come back to church again, this town would be a much better place," was the reply.

However, non-Christians generally don't come to church. They may have needs and questions that they cannot answer, but they do not believe that the

answers can be found in the organized church. This is a symptom of our culture.

Sociologists would describe our Western culture as "postmodern." Most of us have heard the term and have varied levels of understanding of what it even means. I would not spend our time defining it. Gener-

ally, postmodernism is a bad thing, but it affords us one great advantage in the work of Gospel proclamation.

Postmoderns are very distrustful of institutions and really of any authority structure. They do not trust the government. They do not trust law enforcement. They do not trust corporations. They do not trust organized religion. Inviting someone to learn about Jesus through what is perceived as an impersonal institution is culturally irrelevant and ineffective. Although postmoderns do not trust institutions, they are more open to trusting sincere, personal relationships than ever before. When we see

a commercial for a fancy new product, we are often skeptical, but when a personal friend recommends the same product, we are much more likely to try it.

Over the past decades, how have we done evangelism? Primarily, we have evangelized by living a Christ-like life and inviting people to church to hear the Gospel proclaimed. We have invited people to hear the truth, but from organized religion. Sometimes we have left tracts

Gospel by inviting people to church, this is predominantly rejected by our culture today. People do not come because they do not trust organized religion. They lose the opportunity to come to Jesus because they do not want to come to church.

As much as postmoderns mistrust the organized church, they trust sincere, caring relationships. As servants of God, we have unprecedented opportunities to effectively share the Gospel with our

friends and neighbors. If we are willing to speak about Jesus, if we are willing to share the real difference that He makes in our lives, they will listen and consider Jesus. They may not listen to your pastor, but they often will listen to you.

What I love about postmodernism is that the best

way to share the Gospel is through relationships that we already have or ones that we can easily develop. Relationships are forgiving of ineptitude in communication. Relationships seek to understand each other. They are built on sharing, helping and trust which are all very consistent with the Gospel message.

There are many who are ready to believe that Jesus is real and that He loves them, if they see Jesus in you. The sincerity of your care and love for them will make you credible. Your words will be heard and typically trusted. Will you use that trust to point them to Jesus? Will you proclaim the Gospel to them?

As much as postmoderns mistrust the organized church, they trust sincere, caring relationships.

or videos which are produced by organized religion. Today, this is counter-productive amongst postmoderns. We present the Gospel in a form that they are predisposed to mistrust and reject.

One of the doctrines that we treasure in our Fellowship is the priesthood of all believers (see 1 Peter 2:5). This means that every believer is equally a servant of the Lord and that together we all do the work of this ministry. This is evident in our vision statement which, in part, says, "... the Gospel of Jesus Christ is proclaimed by every member of every church"

While we have often proclaimed the

Have We Misunderstood The Great Commission?

"All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations; baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28:18-20 NIV).

The Great Commission commands us to make disciples. It does not command us to go.

Forty five years ago (March 25, 1966), Anna Louise and I sailed (yes, sailed!) to France to serve as missionaries. We were convinced that God had called us to go to France, and we obeyed. We spent 25 years in that land seeking to win people to Christ and teach them to be obedient followers of Jesus Christ.

No doubt most people would say that we were obeying the Great Commission.

My observation is: not necessarily and, hopefully, no more than those who did not receive such a call to go.

Let me explain. I'm not a Greek scholar, but the sources I have consulted are unanimous in their conclusion that this verse has been mistranslated. And this mistranslation may have contributed to a misunderstanding which may actu-

ally have hindered the Church of Jesus Christ from fulfilling it.

What Christ actually said was: "As you go (or "in going") make disciples of all nations" The imperative in this verse is not "go" but "make disciples."

The Great Commission commands us to make disciples. It does not command us to go. It is possible for a person to "go" and yet not make disciples. Such a person would be, in reality, in disobedience to the Great Commission

Furthermore, if the more accurate translation is "as you go" or "in going," that means that one does not need a call to "go" to some foreign land to obey.

Most likely it means that we should seek to make disciples as we go to work, as we go on vacation, as we go on business trips, as we go to visit friends and relatives, as we go to school

If that is so, it is clear that we are called to make disciples wherever we are, even if we have not received a call to go to some other place to do it. We don't have to wait for some call to go to some place to obey the Great Commission. Not everyone is called to go. But everyone is called to make disciples.

No doubt we believe that our 20/20 Vision Statement is rooted in the Great Commission. And we would be right. "We will be a fellowship of churches that equips and inspires one another so that the Gospel of Jesus Christ is proclaimed by every member of every church at every opportunity." It is rooted in the Great Commission (and many other passages); more than we even realize! If all of us are called to make disciples as we go about our daily lives, then it is imperative that the Gospel of Jesus Christ be proclaimed by every member of every church at every opportunity.

It was enough to make just about anyone a little grumpy. The deflating surprises of additional requirements made visits to our immigration office anything but enjoyable. Duplicate birth certificates and police reports that we didn't need, along with required documents that we didn't have only served to raise our frustration level and lower our bank balance. As Ed handed his documents to our agent, we hoped there wouldn't be any more surprises. But, there were!

María suddenly looked up from her computer screen and asked, "What is your religion?"

I didn't remember that question being on the form, but I quickly clued in that this was a personal question. My answer "Evangélico" usually serves to shut down any further questions, but María was undaunted.

"What is it you really believe?" she asked in a soft-

ening tone. A doctrinal statement came to mind but this was no ordination examination. Here was a 35-year-old immigration officer looking for spiritual answers! She confessed to have been born Catholic, but she was looking into other religions. What had she seen in the four families of Team Uruguay that prompted these questions?

Just two days earlier, I had challenged our team to write up their story, in 100 words or less, of how Christ has made a difference in their lives. I delved into my story, telling María about my older brother's tragic accident and my fear of death. María stopped her data entry and listened along with the others waiting in line around us. As we got up to leave, I handed her my card, and she in turn gave me her email address. Now my prayer is that we can serve as *her* "immigration agent" and help her fulfill the requirement of celestial residency.


A Passion for the Impossible

One of the projects of the Commission on Women's Ministries is to send to each missionary woman a package of ministry enrichment material (MEM). Some time ago, a questionnaire indicated that missionary biographies were much desired. This past year we included in their packages a copy of the book, A Passion for the Impossible by Miriam Huffman Rockness, the biography of Lilias Trotter. We thought you might be interested in what kind of material we send to these missionaries

Lilias Trotter was born July 14, 1853, in England. Her family was a happy, disciplined family of the Victorian upper classes — godly, serious, kind to the poor at a distance, sheltered from all that was offensive. Her father was a man of strong character and high principles, but his deep faith was demonstrated in his keen interest in people and their welfare. Her mother also had a great evangelistic zeal. Lilias lost her beloved "papa" at the age of 13, which served to deepen her faith and commitment to her Lord.

Her education continued under governesses, exposure to literature and art and travel abroad. She had a keen eye for beauty and developed her own style of art. She also developed a facility for writing. She used both of these throughout her life, leaving behind a great legacy of books, pamphlets and diaries abundantly illustrated with life scenes around her. Meanwhile, her journey of faith continued under the influence of Hannah Whitehall Smith and Dwight Moody. She became involved in many mission activities in London.

All of this took place while she had continued her art work and came under the critical eye of John Ruskin, a noted art instructor and critic. He had long held the opinion that as a whole, women could not draw or paint like the masters. He was forced to admit that she had the potential to become one of the best artists of the 19th century. Her sketch book was her constant companion as she pursued this talent. John Ruskin was pressuring her to give herself more fully to her art. Lilias struggled with this, especially after her

mother died. She finally came to a decision: She could not give herself to painting and still seek the kingdom of God. She returned to London to her work with the YWCA, where she demonstrated her deep love for the girls under her care. Her intense work was detrimental to her health, greatly affecting her heart and forcing a time of rest.

Foreign missions were becoming of greater importance to the Christian community, and Lilias felt the call of the Lord to go to North Africa. She applied to a mission board but failed to pass the health exam. She was told that she could go to Algeria to work, but not with their organization. So, at age 35, Lilias Trotter left her London home of comfort for a modest dwelling in Algeria. She did not know the language; was without the sponsorship of any organization; was in frail health and faced many obstacles to work in that country for 40 years, where her love of literature and art became dynamic tools for evangelism. Her compassionate heart captured the hearts of the people. She worked in the city buying property and establishing a work among the young girls. She worked in the south, often traveling on a camel to minister to the Berber people. Her health often enforced periods of rest. Opposition became increasingly a problem.

Anyone would be greatly challenged by the myriad facets of her work. Her legacy can be found in the many books, booklets, story parables and letters she wrote. I encourage all to read this very fascinating book.

Last Words

"He brought them out of darkness, the utter darkness, and broke away their chains."

Psalm 107:14 (NIV)

"Connie, can you bring Vinnie to see me tomorrow?"

"Yes, Dad, if that's what you want, I would be happy to bring Vinnie and come visit. Let me know if you need anything before I come."

It was a typical conversation and an even more typical request. It also was not unusual to receive a call minutes later of things my dad would like us to bring to him; maybe his favorite soup, new razor or a candy bar. So there was no reason for me to worry when I began to listen, several hours later, to a message he left on my voice mail.

My attitude quickly changed and I dropped the phone, my hands shaking. I was shocked and horrified at the cruel and unspeakable words he left.

My father had been in a nursing facility for more than two years. Originally, a broken rib had sent him there for rehab. He never left. Battling a lung disease, complications, and side effects from medications, it became obvious that he would not be able to live at home on his own. He could not accept this fate. Often he would call and deliver a dose of guilt to each of his children for not bringing him home to live with them. As time went by, dementia made reasoning with him impossible. We were unable to make him happy, no matter what we did.

We would make regular visits, take him out to lunch, shopping at the mall, bring grandchildren to see him, have dinner together and celebrate birthdays. But before goodbyes were said, we braced ourselves for the heartbreaking conversation of not being able to take him home with us.

My mother passed away while Dad was in the facility. He never recovered. He looked at her picture every moment he could and often cried out for her in the night. The one woman who had taken care of him for almost 60 years was gone. But, sometimes we felt as if

he grieved because he could no longer get his way. My dad had an unusual power over us. If we went against his unrealistic wishes, it was my mother who would suffer. He had an argument with his sister several years ago, and we were forbidden to speak to or have contact with our beloved Aunt. We yielded to this kind of nonsense, but only for the sake of our mother. He continued this behavior even after my mother's stroke when she was confined to a wheelchair.

The reality of knowing Jesus seemed to only complicate our emotions. How do you love someone in a way Jesus would love them? How can you still honor your father even after the cruel way he treated you or your mother? How can you muster up sympathy or compassion when many memories bring quite the opposite emotion? Often it was all too convicting.

As a family, we often ran on auto pilot making sure his needs were taken care of, and at the same time being careful not to take his hurtful words too seriously.

There are five children in our family, and we did our best to protect each other. If one of us was having a tough time emotionally, the rest of us did not expect that one to visit Dad or take his phone calls. It worked out well.

So it was with much relief that after I received the phone message from Dad that frightful day, no one in my family expected me to visit him and act as if nothing was wrong. He had cut deep into my heart and destroyed any respect for him to which I had clung.

For days I dealt with the "no regrets" moments. Would I regret not rising above this situation? Would I blame myself that I couldn't let the Healer heal the deep wound that was created by my own father? Would I regret that I would have to live with his last words spoken to me should he pass away before we spoke again? I was about to find out.

A few weeks later we received the phone call that Dad was being taken to the

hospital emergency. His condition was serious. My sister and I met him at the hospital. He was so weak he could not open his eyes. An oxygen mask was placed over his mouth and nose to help him breathe. God gave me the strength and compassion to hold his hand. The doctor on call gently told us that there was nothing more they could do. As the rest of the family came and gathered, Dad was given medication so that he would have no pain, no stress, no struggle. We removed the oxygen mask and waited.

For two and a half hours I replayed a lot of things in my mind. Not once did that phone message ever come up. Instead, memories of eating popcorn and watching TV together, trips to get ice cream, or the day he walked me down the aisle all came back.

I walked up to his bedside, held his hand and whispered, "I love you, Dad." If he could have, he would have said, "I love you, too, Caboose (his nickname for me)." At that moment there were no last words that either of us would be sorry for. Our last words were not our only words. There were times in our life that our words brought each other laughter and joy.

Even though his last words to me may not have been the best, my father cannot be defined by those words alone. Leave it to my Heavenly Father to remind me of that. I am thankful that *I* am not defined by my sins against others. Jesus died on the cross for my sins and my father's sins.

At the moment my father took his last breath, he was in the presence of God because of Jesus, not because of what he had or hadn't done in his life, but because of what Jesus did in his life.

We chose the song *Amazing Grace* by Chris Tomlin at his funeral, and the chorus explains it all. "My chains are gone, I've been set free. My God my Savior, has ransomed me. And by His love, his mercy reigns, unending love ... Amazing Grace."

EYES ON THE WORLD

Do you ever find yourself going to a big world map or globe to find where our FEBC missionaries serve? This article may be one of those times. Do you know what countries surround Slovenia? How about Ukraine?

A new church plant is being started by Avant Ministries in Slovenia. Where is that, you ask? Well, check out your globe and find it just south of Austria and not too far from Hungary and Croatia. **Kirk and Dannel Blackwell** head up this team effort. They arrived with valuable experience after doing this same kind of ministry in Poland. This year their team is working on language studies which will be used in relationships and ministry building, as God provides. Their goal is to start at least one new church in 2011. Their 11-year-old and 8-year-old daughters attend a local elementary school and are quickly grasping the Slovenian-language.

Another European country little known to the younger generation is Ukraine (once part of Russia). Some of our Mennonite background originates from this country. Now, 100 years later, missionaries are returning to these FEBC roots to take the Gospel back to them. Since 2002 **Greg and Patti Wilton** have served in Ukraine at a regional Bible college with nearly 150 students. Greg teaches Theology, Spiritual Gifts, Christian Worldview and New Testament Overview. Both are active in their church, serving on the leadership team, working with addicts of any kind and helping weekly at the Coffee House. Patti also does a lot of administrative work for SEND Team.

Separately, **Dan and Carrie Ritzman** served in Belgium in different ministries with different mission agencies. 

Significant News from the Front Line for Your Prayers
