



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# Jesus is the Gospel

President's Challenge

Have we proclaimed the Gospel only when we have talked about Jesus' death and resurrection? The Biblical usage of the term indicates that the Gospel certainly includes this (i.e. the Gospel is incomplete without it), but anything about Jesus' relationship with us is also included in the fullness of the Gospel.

It is the responsibility of every believer to proclaim the Gospel. But what is the Gospel? The Gospel is the good news about Jesus. It is the good news of our salvation. At Christmas we were reminded of the name of our newborn Savior. "And she will bring forth a Son, and you shall call His name Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21 NKJV).

The Gospel, Jesus and salvation are interrelated terms. Biblically speaking, salvation and the Gospel are very broad terms. They include what Jesus has done in areas including our calling, our predestination, our justification, our sanctification and our glorification (compare Romans 8). We often associate the Gospel solely with our justification. Let us never minimize the centrality and importance of justification, but the New Testament meaning of the terms salvation and Gospel are far broader than a typical *plan of salvation*, like the "Romans Road" or "Steps to Peace with God."

The good news is that Jesus has saved us. He is transforming us. One day, He will glorify us in heaven. While we are saved solely by God's grace through our faith, God justified us with His purpose of transforming us now and glorifying us forever. All of this is the good news! All of this is the Gospel.

All aspects of Jesus' work — what He has done on the cross, what He is doing in our lives today and what He will do for us in eternity — are part of the Gospel. In a sense, Jesus is the Gospel. In his later years, the devout man Simeon was able to see and hold the baby Jesus. He said, "For my eyes have seen your salvation" (Luke 2:30 NKJV). The Gospel is everything concerning Jesus and particularly His role in our lives. We are to proclaim the Gospel,

but it is more than a typical plan of salvation.

Is there a place for our traditional plans of salvation? Certainly there is. Until people, who stand condemned, have been persuaded that Jesus has paid for their sins and offers to them eternal life, they will not be saved. Certainly, this part of the Gospel unlocks the door to the fullness of the Gospel. The plans of salvation that we use seek to ensure that people know the facts and some of the significance of what Jesus has done on the cross. They express how we can receive eternal life — through believing in Jesus. However, most of the plans of sal-

vation have the narrow focus of justification: the moment of conversion. That is a critical part of the Gospel, but it is not the fullness of the Gospel.

Some people come to Jesus because they are convicted of their sins, and they are concerned about what will happen when they die. For these, the traditional Gospel presentation may be well-sufficient.

Some are not concerned about their death or their sins, but they would be attracted by a Savior who loves them and will be with them in the here and now. Do they know that Jesus really is such a Savior? Are we willing to tell them? They will need to believe the truths about justification prior to receiving His companionship, but their initial attraction may be based on their current needs. The Gospel addresses both their eternal needs (justification) and their temporal needs.

No one becomes a Christian without justification through faith alone, and that needs to be shared, but the fullness of the New Testament meaning of the Gospel includes everything that Jesus has done, is doing and will do. In practical terms, I like to think of the Gospel as being about Jesus: Jesus saves; Jesus forgives; He has justified me; He is with me every day; He is changing me; He listens when I pray; He helps me when I need Him; He gives me meaning and a reason to live; He gives me hope for the future; He is preparing a home for me in heaven.... There is no end to the list of what Jesus has done, is doing and will do for me. These truths about Jesus are all good news. They are all part of the Gospel. Proclaim it all. Proclaim Jesus!

# Salem Church takes on the challenge of moving forward with Fellowship's vision

Today my doctor told me he wanted to meet next week to discuss the results of my recent blood test. I don't expect we are getting together to celebrate the impressive health of my body; much to my chagrin, we are likely going to discuss high cholesterol. As I anticipate this conversation, what troubles me most is the change I will need to make in my diet in order to bring down my cholesterol. I love my current diet. I don't want to snack less at work or skip dessert after supper. Nevertheless, if I want to see long-term health return to my body, I will need to find the will to make short-term sacrifices so I can form some new eating habits (I cringe as I type this).

A year and half ago, as a Fellowship, we

approved our new vision. I believe our vision paints an impressive picture of a reality that is only possible if God intervenes and changes me and you, and our churches and communities. Typically, we want God to transform the latter ASAP, with minimal work on the former — and preferably in the reverse order, with me last (if at all).

However, as Fellowship churches have discussed the embodiment of our vision within their congregations, it is becoming painfully obvious that the biggest changes must happen in me and you. We must find the will to sacrifice some of our comforts and form new habits so that we can become a proclaiming people.

Unfortunately, selfless living does not come naturally to any of us. It is a daily choice. And if we do not choose to live in this way, we revert to our default setting of selfishness. Selfishness is also the default setting of our churches. Without vision we tend to focus on what our church is or isn't doing for us, and our most passionate conversations focus on matters of preference like style of music, the youth pastor's tattoo and the color of carpet in the sanctuary.

One of the things I really like about the new vision for the Fellowship is that it takes the focus off of ourselves and places it on those outside our churches, those who desperately need an encounter with Jesus. When the FEBC first cast this vision I felt a renewed excitement and eagerness to work with God as He changes our world. What concerns me now, a year and half after the fact, is that if we are not acting on this vision, we will more than likely settle back into our default setting.

If proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ at every opportunity is going to become a common behavior in our churches, our church leaders must start wrestling with the question: "How is this going to happen?" Obviously modeling the proclamation of the Gospel with their own lives is an extremely important first step for our leaders. However, it is not enough for a leader to plan what he will do to fulfill this vision; a leader is also responsible for giving direction to what we will do as congregations.

Several weeks ago Salem Church in Waldheim, Sask., took an important step toward figuring out what they are going to do in order to become a proclaiming people. They organized an off-site retreat for their elder board and in-

vited Terry Schultz, a professional consultant and son of former FEBC ministries coordinator Harvey Schultz, to facilitate an action plan. The goal of this process was for the elders to establish four or five points of action that they could begin to implement into their own lives and challenge their congregation to implement as well.

I could tell that even before the weekend began the elders were strongly committed to the Fellowship's vision. They had already committed themselves to praying daily for lost friends by name. Even a small step like this can have a significant impact on raising our awareness to opportunities we have to proclaim the Gospel in our everyday lives.

A few things occurred to me as I listened and participated in the discussion with the team from Salem:

- There are no easy answers. It is going to take time to figure out how to carry out
- The best plans of action are not likely going to be new programs for our churches to run.
- Some of the most effective items on our action plan will only be discovered through trial and error.

This is why it is so important for us to work together as a Fellowship. If you are a leader in your church, there is a great challenge before you. How are you going to lead your congregation to becoming people who proclaim the Gospel at every opportunity? Remember, you are not alone. We are a Fellowship that, with God's help, can conquer this challenge together. Let's share our ideas with one another. Let's share the stories of our successes and failures with one another. Let's continue to ask God to form His life and love in me and you so we can proclaim this Good News that many have yet to hear.

# A New Identity, with a Purpose

"But you are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, His own special people, that you may proclaim the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His glorious light" (2 Peter 2:9 NKJV).

What a privilege it is to be a believer in Christ and a member of His bride, the Church. Many of us have treasured this verse as representing the great change that has been provided for us through Jesus' death and resurrection. It describes the new identity that we have in Christ.

First, we are a chosen generation. Sometimes people's theology of salvation would suggest that God looks up after people choose to follow Him or not and then sees His team. That is not a Biblical perspective. God has chosen you. He saw you amongst all of humanity and has chosen you. That choice was based on His love and grace, but nonetheless, He chose you. You are not the one that no one wanted. God chose you because He wanted you.

We are a royal priesthood. The key thought here is that we have been given full access to the presence of God. In the Old Testament, only the priests were able to enter the Temple, which represented the presence of God. In contrast, we have full access to the very near presence of God and from there we

can worship Him and intercede for others directly to Him.

Consider again what Jesus has done for us. How can we be silent?

We are **a holy nation**. The word holy means set apart. We are set apart by God from something and unto something. We are set apart from sin. It is God's intention that we overcome sin. He has equipped us by His grace to overcome every temptation. He always makes with the temptation a way of escape (cf. 1 Cor. 10:13). We are also set apart unto righteousness. God's plan for us is that we would perform acts of righteousness; good works which He has already planned for us to do (cf. Eph. 2:10).

We are **His own special people**. We live on a planet of about seven billion people. If you are a one-in-a-million kind of person, there are 7,000 just like you! Yet with God, you are special. You are special because God is infinite.

He intimately knows your uniqueness. He has made you special and He treasures you because He made you like no other. He loves you like no other.

What a description of how blessed we are! Yet these descriptions have a purpose: He has done all of this in order that we would praise Him. "... that you may proclaim the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His glorious light" (1 Peter 2:9). Praise is an outward expression of thanks to God for what He has done in us. Of course, we should praise Him when we are together as believers. That is the point of much of the singing and praying that we do in church. However, that proclamation of praise ought not to be limited to those who already know Jesus. It should be made before non-Christians. Consider again what Jesus has done for us. How can we be silent?

Sometimes the devil tries to silence our proclamation of God's praise through things like fear and busyness. But it is a deception. God has chosen you. He has brought you into His very near presence. He has set you apart to live in victory over sin and to do acts of righteousness. You are special. Praise Him. Proclaim His praises to both Christian and non-Christian alike.

#### **Leadership Development Seminar**

One day before the FEBC Workshop (Feb. 16), **FEBC President Blaine Donaldson** and consultant **Terry Schultz** will present a leadership training seminar on "Maturing as a Leadership Team." # Eyes on the World

Forty percent (about 33) of our FEBC missionary units live in North America. Several of these work exclusively in local ministries: Awana, children's clubs, Canadian Sunday School Mission, rural church/Sunday school development, New Tribes Mission training centers, children and youth development homes or camps and Northern Canada Evangelical Mission. However, many others live in North America but have a ministry that reaches into remote places overseas.

One such family is **Gary and Valerie Brumbelow**. After serving 32 years in the field and as directors of InterAct Ministries, they joined Disciple Nations Alliance (DNA) in 2010. From his home office in Oregon, Gary engages with people in Africa, Latin America and Asia. DNA is working in more than 60 countries, mo-

bilizing trainers who equip churches to bring transformation to their communities. Gary is directly involved in editing a blog for the leader, Darrow Miller. He also writes stories for DNA Global News and publishes the e-newsletter.

After 35 years in Ecuador, working in hospital administration and personnel development, **Roger and Lois Reimer** are newly settled into a home in Oregon. They carry on a ministry with HCJB Global. Their efforts include college internships, ministry teams, working visitors and vision journeys. Just recently they partnered with Apoyo ministry as a teacher/trainer/mentor/coach for national colleagues who serve as pastors or church leaders.

**Please Pray**: Gary is the co-writer with Darrow Miller on a new book on the Great Com-

mission. Pray for successful publication and release of this new book. Also pray for the development of a series of videos designed to be used on Facebook, YouTube and other Arabspeaking social media networks. Immediate concerns are funding and the completion of the project.

In 2012, the Reimers will participate in training workshops in Ecuador and Guatemala, plus lead a college internship in Ecuador. Pray that the right college students will apply in the next few months. Roger and Lois request guidance in this process. A personal request is that God will help their daughter-in-law Melisa Reimer to recover well from kidney transplant surgery received at the end of 2011.

#### **Church Builders Revolving Loan Fund**

In 1995 the Fellowship established a fund to provide low-interest loans to church plants for their first building. As loans were paid back, other churches could use the money. Individual members of our Fellowship were encouraged to give \$5 per month to this fund. By this fall, more than \$34,500 was available in the United States, and the Canadian fund held \$48,000 (but most of this amount is currently loaned out). We deeply appreciate each person who has given to this fund. However, because commercial interest rates are so low, few churches need these loans right now. Only one church is currently using this program. After consideration, the Executive Committee advises that we stop accepting contributions for this fund effective Dec. 31. Current funds will be maintained and will continue to grow through interest.

#### **Nominations**

Except for two paid staff members, our Fellowship is made up of volunteer workers from our churches. Twenty-four positions will be open this summer, and these must be filled by people from our churches. People are needed on the commissions of Church Planting, Churches, Education, Missions, Trustees, and Women's Ministries. If you have an interest in these areas, talk to your church leaders or pastor. They have more information about the qualifications and job descriptions for these positions.

# Papyrus Project Takes a Mighty Leap

The seed has sprouted! In 2010 FEBC churches gave \$12,000 to Source of Light Ministries to develop Bible studies on a small, solar-powered digital player. Because of your gifts, a limited number of players are now in use in Ethiopia. Thank you!

I recently made a ministry trip to Ethiopia with colleague Les Fox and Pastor Mesfen Tadessa, the associate pastor of a nearby Ethiopian church. Our primary purpose was to train church leaders to incorporate the Papyrus player into their teaching ministries. Thirty-seven leaders from three denominations representing 4,200 churches went through the training.

Tuesday, Nov. 15: We divided the 37 into six groups to practice using the players. I wish you could have sat in the front of the auditorium with me and listened as first one, then another, and still another player came on and Pastor Tadessa's voice began to read the assigned lesson. Then, after a few minutes, the voice would stop, and I began hearing the members of the various groups discuss what they had heard. I knew this was the small beginning of a much larger ministry throughout the length and breadth of Ethiopia.

**Wednesday, Nov. 16**: An early morning knock found Ethiopian director Haile Selassie Tefera at the door with an idea: He asked if we could have the group leaders do a demonstration on using the players. This was so successful that we had two of the groups on Wednesday afternoon and Thursday morning do similar demonstrations.

**Friday, Nov. 18:** All 37 leaders graduated from the course! Thirty leaders received both a beautiful certificate and a player, and the other seven received a certificate. Will you pray with us that this exciting beginning will result in many turning to Christ for salvation

and then growing in the grace and knowledge of Him?

Tuesday, Nov. 22: We got to watch one of our students in action at a church at the edge of what we would call a red light district. Many of the young converts were former prostitutes and drug addicts. I was told that only about 10 percent of the congregation is literate. What a place to try out a Papyrus player! Our student came to the class prepared to teach. He combined the Papyrus audio lesson with a white board and group discussion to create a dynamite 90-minute class. At one point he divided the group of 40 to 50 young people into smaller groups, appointed leaders and then went among them guiding their discussion. Then, at the end of the class he had each group leader give a two-minute report on the conclusions of their group.

We saw two by-products of the training. The first was an apparent jump in the sale of printed lessons. Haile does not have a school in his SLM branch such as we have here in Madison. He establishes associate discipleship schools in churches, and they purchase the lessons for use in their churches' ministries. For example, the director of World Vision for Ethiopia ordered 50,000 lesson booklets the week following the training!

A second by-product of the training was the entrance into a second language. Oromo is spoken by 44 percent of the people of Ethiopia, and our courses have already been translated and printed in this language. One participant asked if we could record the lessons in Oromo. He has a niece who speaks Oromo fluently and who attends Addis Ababa University. She was contacted and has agreed to record the lessons. A Christian radio station will allow us to use a studio; now we hope to soon have all the Amharic audio courses available in Oromo, too.

Future Plans: While I cannot now speak officially, I can say that we would like to get 1,000 players into Ethiopia in 2012. One thousand players will cost \$46,000! Please ask that God will provide the monies needed for the players and for several of us to return to Ethiopia next October or November to provide additional training. I hope that Source of Light Ethiopia will be ready to take over the player project by 2013.

A window of opportunity: During the training I got a sense of urgency among the assembled leaders. I mentioned this to Pastor Tadessa, and he confirmed that he had picked up this sense of urgency in conversations with several of the leaders. While the church is now free to preach the Gospel, we don't know how long they will have that freedom. Please pray they will faithfully and diligently preach God's Word while this window of opportunity is open.

# Infected!


Jim Brandt, a former pastor at Mountain Lake, Minn., and his wife, Linda, recently traveled on a short-term assignment to Romania, working with young people in orphanages who have HIV/AIDS. These youth contracted the disease through blood transfusions when they were young. Romanian law does not allow anyone who is HIV-positive to hold a job, so these young people are not even educated. Jim and his group held a camp for some of these in their late teens and early twenties.

A new enemy was sneaking its way into the lives of thousands of innocent Romanian children — this enemy was HIV.

Nestled on a quiet, back street in Resita, Romania, is a plain, gray house, one you might not even notice as you walk by it. But this nondescript building is a sanctuary of hope and a place of unconditional love and acceptance for the lost and rejected outcasts of this Eastern European country — the HIV-infected kids of Romania. This building is the home of the Joshua Project Day Center. Most importantly, this house is where, week-after-week, missionary couples Andy and Tresha McKnight and Tony and Claudia Undrea, share the unconditional love and forgiveness only found in a relationship with Jesus Christ. Since 1999 they have witnessed the heart-change in hundreds of HIV/AIDS infected kids. Hearts once darkened with the pain of rejection and fear of death are now shining brightly, and bubbling over with love for others because Jesus lives in them. How exciting to watch as these kids eagerly share the Good News of what Jesus has done for them with others infected with HIV - kids at their orphanage, kids living in deplorable home conditions due to their infection, or homeless kids they know living on the street. How did this amazing ministry start? Step back to 1989...

... the Communist Party was overthrown in Romania. The world rejoiced at Romania's newfound freedom, and humanitarian aid began to pour into the country to help alleviate the suffering and poverty the Communist regime had left behind. Along with food and clothing came medical supplies — blood products to be used in hospitals, clinics and especially orphanages for the treatment of child malnourishment. Unfortunately, blood screening was not practiced in those days, so although the Romanian people had found political freedom, a new enemy was sneaking its way into the lives of thousands of innocent Romanian children — this enemy was HIV.

Fast-forward to 1999 ... Tresha Inglis, a new missionary to Romania, met Claudia Udrea at a tram stop in Timisoara, Romania.





Conditions at the hospitals were deplorable and supplies limited. Lack of education, hope, and training for staff, families and caretakers caused these children to be abused, abandoned and left for dead — even in the hospital! However, God had other plans, and the Joshua Project World Ministries was born.

In July 2010, while in Romania, a group of four Minnesotans visited Joshua Project and got infected with Jesus' love for these wonderful young people; infected with a desire to step out of their comfort zone and share in this unique and exciting ministry to precious ones whose hearts need the healing touch of the Savior; and infected with the desire to love and serve them as Jesus would. Joshua Project World Ministries reaches out to these special kids and their families in a variety of ways, showing them love by being their advocates and counselors. # Catch the Vision

# Colors of the Wordless Bracelet Provide a Golden Opportunity

After attending a funeral, we traveled home through Montana's majestic mountains by train in the daylight on Thanksgiving Day. We decided to visit the observation car. After enjoying the scenery awhile, I got up to walk about, and as I passed by two fellows on the other side of the car, one called to me, "Hi! We like to visit people. I'm Paul, and my friend is John. We're from Maui, Hawaii."

I replied, "You've got good Bible names. My name is Vivian Wall, and my husband, Dwaine, is sitting right over there."

John's eyes widened. He said, astounded, "You are the third person who has talked to us about the Bible on this trip. The second lady had a bracelet on her wrist with colors that had some kind of meaning. Do you know anything about those colors?"

"Yes, I do, "I said. "I taught four and five year olds. They cannot read, so I enjoy using those colors in a wordless book to tell them about the central message of the Bible. Did the lady's bracelet start with the color yellow, and have black or red and white in it?"

"Yes, I think so," John said. "Do you know what they mean?"

I began to explain. "Yellow represents the streets of gold in heaven. If you pretended my hands were a book, and I turned the page from yellow, it would be all black. Black stands for the darkened heart of sin that we are born with. Our grandson, who was born at the end of October, he seemed really perfect, and so innocent. But he will soon enough say "no" to

his Mom and Dad, and no one will have taught him to disobey. He inherited his hair from his Dad, and his face shape from his Grandpa, but he also inherited the inclination to do wrong — sin, from Adam, the first person in the Bible, who passed it on to all of us. All have sinned and fallen short of the perfection God requires."

I continued. "The next color was red. It stands for the blood of Jesus. This is important because Jesus is the Son of God, and His blood was worthy. Because Jesus is God, He could die for the sin of the whole world and it was enough. Nothing more was needed."

I asked John if he would like a New Testament to read.

"No, I wouldn't read it if you gave it to me," he replied. "Besides, I don't believe those disciples were saints or anything but men."

"The disciples were simple men. But they were people God used to tell of the life of Jesus, like a witness on a stand."
