

Community Service: An Open Door for the Gospel

What good does it do to feed starving bellies without ministering to their spiritual starving souls? It is offensive when social action replaces the proclamation of the Gospel. However, my tendency is to overreact to this thinking by having little or no involvement in social action.

By social action, I mean service outside the walls of the church to people who do not go to our church. Social action focuses on the physical, financial, social or emotional needs of those outside of our churches. While social action is often associated with homeless shelters and feeding the hungry around the world, it legitimately includes serving as a coach of a community softball team to volunteering at a local hospital.

So often, we have thought of evangelism as knocking on doors and other cold-contact connections with people. God has used cold-contact evangelism in the lives of millions in North America. He continues to use this today, but to a much lesser degree than a few decades ago. People today are predisposed not to trust a person with whom they have no relationship. Without trusting the messenger, they are much less likely to listen to the message of the Gospel. God

can work despite the lack of trust barrier, but why not share the Gospel in a way that does not have that barrier?

We have the opportunity to build

trusting relationships in our community through serving. Can you imagine how many opportunities to share Jesus we would have if every family in our church volunteered

one night a week in some community service activity? In a small town, we would have someone serving on every program in that town (and we would create a few more). Even in a city, we could have a consequential and noticeable presence.

How can we find these opportunities? It may be as simple as just going up to a school administrator and asking, "What can I do to help the people that you work with?" We could ask the same question at the hospital, nursing home, Boy Scouts, Department of Natural Re-

sources, Social Services, police, Humane Society, fire department, Red Cross, etc.

Serve God by serving the community. Serve as unto the Lord. But service

is not the end. Service is the door for the Gospel. As you go through the doors of service, make disciples. Proclaim the Good News of who Jesus is and what He has done for you. It is not enough just to serve; we are called to both serve and speak.

So do we proclaim Christ or serve in the community? That is the wrong question. We should ask ourselves "How can we proclaim Jesus through our service in the community?" We should be serving and proclaiming. As we go and serve, proclaim Jesus.

What happens when more than 100 men and boys gather in the great outdoors to enjoy sharpening their outdoor hunting, fishing and shooting skills? Not only is it a time of adventure, but a great opportunity to strengthen relationships and share the Gospel.

That's exactly what Hebron Bible Church did recently when it helped to sponsor and organize Men's Outdoor Adventure Day near Fairbury, Neb. Hebron's Pastor Jeff Friesen shares more in "Catch the Vision" on the back cover of this issue of Fellowship Focus.

A lot of prayer went into the planning, Jeff said. "We prayed that we would have cold and wet weather up to the event, and great weather on the day of; that God would turn the hearts of the fathers to their sons and the sons to their fathers; and open up the hearts of those there to respond to the Gospel message." Organizers also prayed for clarity for those sharing their testimonies.

God answered very specifically, Jeff reported. "We had a beautiful, 60-plus degree day, surrounded by cold, rainy and snowy weather on both sides. We had more than 100 people at an event that had never been held before, competing with lots of other activities. We had only one injury, despite all of the crazy things that we were doing."

And, Jeff added, testimonies of how God has used the day are coming to light. One mother shared that it had been a long time since her son came home "fired up for the Lord," as he had when he returned that night. Another father was grateful because "I don't get to do a lot of things with my sons, because we don't have a whole lot of money. This was a great day for us." Still others were inspired to evangelism, as was one boy when, on the ride home, he asked a friend if he had ever placed his faith in Jesus Christ, encouraging him to do so.

When God's vision becomes ours, He takes the events of our lives, and our prayers, and uses them to bring others closer to a saving knowledge of Him, as He did through Men's Outdoor Adventure Day. Living in light of that vision does indeed take us on the adventure of a lifetime.



Focus on the Word

Paul declared to the Galatians that following a set of religious rules and regulations can actually hinder us from living the Christian life because it may divert us away from relying on the indwelling power of the Holy Spirit (see last month's article entitled Fallen From Grace?!). I'd like to expand that discussion.

Some human beings can achieve great moral victories by their own selfdiscipline in following a strict code of moral ethics. And there is great danger that we attempt to follow and teach that formula for the Christian walk. We know that God expects us to live a life of moral excellence. Certainly, as sinful human beings, we need some restraining influence on our lives. So we develop a set of principles to prevent us from falling into sin. Read your Bible. Pray daily. Don't tell lies. Pursue purity. Confess your sins. And to motivate ourselves to do these things, we remind ourselves of the consequences of failure. We fear those consequences. We fear God's displeasure. We don't want to miss His best for us. We don't want to be in God's spiritual "doghouse" of discipline. So we adopt a behavior pattern which we think will enable us to avoid and overcome sin and avoid God's displeasure. It can easily become a fear-based behavior modification program. Do this, this and this, or suffer the consequences!

God has a better way. In fact, it is the only way which is equally effective for

all types of personalities. It is so simple that we may fail to pick up on it. He says: "Live by the Spirit and you will not gratify the desires of the sinful nature" (Galatians 5:16). All too often our approach is: Don't gratify the desires of the sinful nature and you will live by the Spirit.

Living by the Spirit can be encapsulated by two simple principles: Submit to His leading and — all-important — trust in His indwelling power to enable us to do it. The Spirit of God leads through the Word, through the teaching, guidance and advice of others, and through our enlightened conscience. But knowing and being willing to follow His leading will not enable us to do it. We totally lack that ability because His standard is absolute divine perfection. So we must trust Him to accomplish these things in us and for us. He is God. He is all powerful. He is our new life. He dwells in us. He waits for our invitation (our trust) to do in and through us what God wants.

How will we know if we are actually trusting Him to live His life in us? As He has the freedom to live His life in us, the fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23) will begin to be evident in our lives. And where the fruit of the Spirit is abundant, there will be no room for the works of the flesh (Galatians 5:19-21). So it isn't a question of trying to repress the works of the flesh or of seeking to produce the fruit of the Spirit (patience, for example). Rather, it is a question of trusting the indwelling

power of the Holy Spirit to enable us to follow His leading. As we do that, His life will be increasingly evident in us and He is love, joy, peace, patience, etc.

What would motivate me to live such a life? Gratitude! Out of gratitude to Him for all He has done for me, I am motivated to trustingly submit to His leading. Instead of seeking to please God by a fear-based behavior modification program, I am now experiencing a love-motivated, Spirit-enabled, inward transformation which is increasingly outwardly evident. It's a way of life accessible to all character types, the young and the old, the mature and the immature.

Listen once more to the Apostle Paul from Galatians:

"Are you so foolish? After beginning with the Spirit, are you now trying to attain your goal by human effort?" (3:3).

- "... Christ lives in me. The life I live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God" (2:20).
- "... live by the Spirit and you will not gratify the desires of the sinful nature" (5:16).

One final question: Have we clearly taught our believing children and the new converts among us *why* the Holy Spirit lives in them? Or have we conveyed to them that victory is ours via a behavior modification program?

This month we focus on vignettes from three missionaries in three very different circumstances and locations, all proclaiming Christ where they have been placed.

Darwin and Karen Stoesz began their missionary career with a couple of short-term mission trips. First Darwin went to Mali, followed by one year in Japan teaching English. From the trip to Japan, God gave Darwin a heart for the 99.5 percent of the Japanese people who do not know Christ. After Darwin and Karen were married, they went to Japan for two years to teach English. They returned to the States to raise support to return to Japan for a four-year term. Darwin recalls, "I remember studying at a McDonalds in Tokyo. It was hard work, I didn't get it, and I wanted to give up. I remember looking around the room and seeing how everyone appeared happy and content. Then it struck me: They may look okay, but if everyone in that McDonalds went through eternity separated from Christ because no one told them about Jesus, was that okay? God has moved in our hearts in a special way and has given us a burden specifically for the Japanese. It's this burden that keeps us in Japan to see what God will continue to do in the lives of these amazing people."

As Darwin and Karen look forward to another term in that country, they are seeing changes again in the responsibilities and the avenues God is giving them to reach the Japanese people. Darwin will partner with the Nishibori Christ Gospel Church to encourage the Japanese Christians to proclaim Christ in their community, as well as take over the responsibility of treasurer and business manager of the SEND Japan office. As such, Darwin will also have the opportunity to proclaim Christ in the marketplace. Karen will build relationships with Japanese women in her community and help them understand the God of the Bible and their need of a Savior.

Darwin and Karen plan to return to Japan in June and are looking for prayer and financial partners to make this return possible. If you would like to help the ministry to the Japanese people, you may contact the FEBC office for details.

Doug and LeAnn Clark serving with Village Missions, have many reasons to celebrate God working in and through their

ministries in Nisland, S. D. Progress is being made on the "Celebrate Recovery" ministry as three leaders attended training in Spearfish. They hope the recovery ministry will be up and running by May. Pray for an additional male leader for this ministry. Also, a bus has been put into service to transport kids and adults to various activities. Pray for the Lord's direction and blessing as they seek to use the bus to facilitate lifechanging ministry in the lives of precious people.

The Clarks were also able to take part in the Spiritual Leaders Summit at the State Capitol. They met with lobbyists and became acquainted with the key bills lawmakers will be voting on that will influence matters of life and faith as a Christian. Pray for Christians everywhere to *stand* for biblical principles in the face of ridicule and rejection.

Valentine's Day was an opportunity for the youth to reach out to the elderly of the community with Valentine cards. Pray for a harvest of souls and spiritual growth there. The Clarks also saw God's healing power in the lives of individuals who had surgeries. These were just more opportunities to proclaim Christ to the community of Nisland.

Sam and Debra Dick are involved in the regional office, assisting the director of Avant Ministries in Spain. Sam's responsibilities include writing letters to the Ministry of Justice, meeting with lawyers, and helping with legal documents on behalf of the Avant missionaries in there.

Sam shared a time he had to proclaim Christ. "Over this past year, I've had opportunity to connect with a vegetable seller in the market downtown. His name is Julio. He's very friendly and loves to visit with me in English, though I try to chat with him in Spanish when I see him. A few weeks back I was able to give him a copy of a booklet that clearly presents the Gospel, "You Can Be Sure." He was happy to receive it (in Spanish) though he seemed like he would maybe have appreciated getting a copy in English. He seems open to "spiritual" things, though I'm not sure how open he is to what the Bible has to say. Pray that Julio would read and be able to understand the offer of God's grace for him, and pray that I would have more opportunities to follow up with conversations with him."

Draw'n to Jesus

As a very young person I had opened my hand and given Him my life and abilities. Later when the time was right,

He again placed a pencil in that hand to serve and praise Him.



From the time I was old enough to grip a crayon or pencil, drawing has been a personal passion. Much to my mother's dismay, by the time I could stand, walls would become my canvas to cover. Then, during my school years, I was introduced to a variety of mediums and canvases. My impatient and perfectionist nature caused me to give up on slow drying, messy and unpredictable art ventures. I found that the portable and erasable pencil was more my style. Besides, my allowance then and my budget now easily affords a #2 pencil and the art gum eraser that quickly removes my errors.

As a young child I had been drawn to Christ through my Christian parents and my Bible church. I trusted Jesus as my Savior at the age of six. As I grew older my desire was to use my art to bring others to Him, but how? After high school I began by majoring in art in secular college, not having any plan after finishing.

However, during my first year at the university, I read a line in a pamphlet that stated something like this: *The world needs more full-time Christian workers, not another musician, teacher or artist.* After contemplating those words, thinking my drawing was not very useful to God, I decided to attend Bible school the next year and give my life to full-time Christian service. For the time being, I was being drawn to study His Word, a decision I have never regretted! But the art pencils seldom came out of the box.

During those years I was also drawn to a relationship with John Skillman, marriage and later motherhood. Following were the busy years of being a pastor's

wife and raising two boys. The pencil container became quite dusty. This did leave me somewhat frustrated, feeling as though there was still a creative part of me that needed to be fulfilled. But thankfully, Edith Schaeffer's book Hidden Art was brought to my attention, and her words left me content to use my artistic gifts to contribute to the beauty of my family, home and church. No longer did I feel guilty about neglecting a gift, but happily cooperated with God in designing lovely young lives for eternity rather than designing a picture that in the long run would end up in the trash or gather dust in some attic.

When my children were older I did find small bits of time for sketching. Also, during that era, some visiting missionaries saw some of my work and said that they needed similar pictures to decorate a coffee house in Japan. I felt as though God was saying that the time had come to open the lid of the pencil case. Later, after moving to Lustre, Mont., and being involved in fundraisers for the Christian high school, I was able to give many drawings to their auctions. Church-related artistic endeavors followed. Now the pencil case was open quite often! Soon I was also designing brochures for Bible camp, making report covers, and completing a variety of artistic projects for Christian uses. Also, I found that making cards scanned from drawings made nice gifts and encouragement notes. Sketching for relaxation has become valuable to me as well. On long isolated winter days, the pencil brings a kind of spring to my life.

(My pastor husband, during a series on the Psalms, recently challenged us to write our own Psalm. One early March day I penciled these words, adapted from Psalm 150):

Praise the Lord!

Praise God in His golden dwelling.

Praise God in His sapphire skies.

Praise Him for the lingering of the silvery winter.

Praise Him for the soon coming of the emerald spring.

Praise Him with the stroke of the graphite pencil.

Praise Him with the mark of the colored pencil.

Praise Him with the soft streak of the pastel pencil

Let every drawing in the sketchpad praise the Lord!

Proposing a New Governance Model

For decades the Fellowship has been directed by an Executive Committee made up of the chairs of the various commissions plus the president, vice-president recording secretary and administrator. Although this has had some advantages in keeping all the commission chairs "in the loop" about what the other commissions were doing, it has created a huge time commitment for the chairs. Not only do they have to direct their commissions; they also have to meet several times a year for Executive Committee meetings.

A new structure will be proposed this summer that would replace the Executive Committee with a Board of Directors. This board would be responsible for the direction and management of the Fellowship. The commission chairs would then be only responsible to guide their commissions in the work they have been assigned.

Another new group, the Doctrinal Council, will ensure that the Articles of Faith of the Fellowship articulate, to the current generation, an accurate understanding of the Scriptures, and that the Fellowship is addressing pertinent social issues through Position Papers.

These changes will be presented in a new constitution. No changes are proposed to the current Doctrinal Statement or Position Papers with the exception that the "Ordinances and Practices" section of the current constitution would be promoted to a Position Paper status in the proposed constitution. Restore Sahel Academy

This summer's convention project is to provide \$20,000 to Sahel Academy in Niamey, Niger, to repair damage caused by last summer's devastating and long-lasting flood. Here is an update on the progress at the school from Director Brian Bliss:

Some facts and figures ...

Schooling materials, books, etc, were mostly spared by planning ahead and placing items up high. We were blessed. This is what allowed us to continue schooling in temporary facilities.


Some of the large expenses are ...

- Repainting by the time all the walls are repainted, we will have used more than 200 gallons of paint. A five-gallon bucket costs about \$80.
- Carpentry All cabinetry that could not be moved will have to be rebuilt. We do not have stores or factories to buy our furnishings. Skilled African carpenters from a country where woodworking is done (Ivory Coast) are here, working almost non-stop 10 hours a day, six days a week, to complete the approximately 600-linear feet of counters, desks, bookshelves, and cabinets. Everything is made from plywood. A sheet of plywood costs \$40. To date, more than 250 sheets of plywood have been purchased, with more still needed. Once
- built, everything receives four coats of varnish. We are going through gallons and gallons of varnish (\$7 a gallon)!

 The industrial stove/oven (Wolf Brand) sat mostly submerged for almost two weeks. We have cleaned it up, but are sure that
- we need new parts for the oven to work again (\$800).

 Thirty air conditioning units sat in the flood waters. An electrician has cleaned and tested them. Amazingly, most have sur-
- Thirty air conditioning units sat in the flood waters. An electrician has cleaned and tested them. Amazingly, most have survived. Some did not. We must replace 10 units (\$600 each).

We have been blessed to have some come to help. They truly brought hope and gave us a glimpse of the "light at the end of the tunnel"!



Focus on FEBC Church Plan ing

Historic Moment in Tisdale, Saskatchewan



Community Bible Church of Tisdale has reached a pivotal moment in its growth and development.

When the Commission on Church Planting agreed to adopt Community Bible Church as a church planting project in 2005, it committed our Fellowship to provide the resources which would enable the church to develop and attain full autonomy within the Fellowship of Evangelical Bible Churches. What resources have we provided, and how has this affected Community Bible Church?

Monthly financial subsidies

enabled the church to meet all of its financial obligations, including the pastor's salary, even though the group was small. Subsidies peaked in 2006 at \$35,800! Since then, as planned, subsidies have been steadily reduced (early in 2008 Prairie West Extension assumed full responsibility for the subsidies) as the church has grown and

increasingly taken on greater financial responsibility.

Guidance: Saskatchewan churches, through Prairie West Extension, established a Steering Committee to guide and nurture the new church. Thus, two important principles were respected:

■ Financial accountability: FEBC sub-

sidies are never granted without accountability.

■ Spiritual and strategic support for the church planter: All FEBC church planters are to receive strategic guidance and spiritual support to enable them to be effective in their ministry. This is crucial when there is lack of depth in local church leadership.

Building loan: The original building became just too small. Last year, combining local church savings, a



\$60,000 loan from Prairie West Extension and a lot of local volunteer labor and donations, the church was able to expand that building and celebrate the opening of a 150-seat auditorium.

As this was happening, local men have been trained and encouraged to serve. Today two local men have been recognized as local church elders. Both of them have been carefully evaluated as to their spiritual and moral maturity and integrity. In addition, qualified men serve on a very capable Property and Finance Committee.

It is exciting to report that today the congregation is meeting in a spacious auditorium. Subsidies have ceased as of Jan. 1, 2013. The Steering Committee was dissolved on March 24. On that date, at the Annual General Meeting of the church, we celebrated the autonomy of Community Bible Church.

> At the Fellowship's convention in July, the FEBC Commission on Church Planting will make a motion to the convention delegates that Community Bible Church of Tisdale, Sask., be recognized as an autonomous church within our Fellowship.

> March 24 was indeed an historic moment in the life of Community Bible Church. Rejoice with them! To all who prayed for them, we say

thank you! We encourage you to continue to pray earnestly for this church. Pray for robust spiritual, numerical and financial growth along with healthy internal development and organization. This will enable the church to maintain a solid foundation for future ministry to the growing community of Tisdale.

Reduce Taxes by Giving from IRAs to Fund Ministries

Seventy is the magic age at which people must begin to make withdrawals from their IRAs. However, the U.S. government has provided an incentive for people over 701/2 to turn their withdrawal into a charitable gift to their church or charity. These gifts must come directly from their IRA account and go directly to a charity (or church). This window is only open until Dec. 31, 2013.

The gifts are limited to a maximum of \$100,000 for the year, and must be made directly to a charitable organization

such as the Fellowship of Evangelical Bible Churches (gifts to donor-advised funds and charitable trusts do not qualify). For donors who meet the qualifications of this legislation, this gift is accomplished without triggering any federal or state income taxes, until Dec. 31, 2013. Do not withdraw money from your IRA and then write a check to a charity — you will lose tax advantages. The money must come directly from the IRA account to the charity.







More than 100 fathers, grandfathers, sons and grandsons gathered for Men's Outdoor Adventure Day at Camp Jefferson outside of Fairbury, Neb., in April. Participants were assigned to small groups of about 15 people, and the groups cycled through six stations of trap shooting, muzzle loading, archery, fishing, trapping and big game hunting. In most stations, presenters spent a few minutes reviewing hunter safety tips and then allowed the participants to try some target shooting. Muzzle loaders, archery equipment, shotguns and fishing poles were all



provided by the Nebraska Game and Parks. Another seminar demonstrating trapping techniques and one on big game hunting, led by Scott Glasscock, a biologist with the Christian Outdoor Fellowship of America, rounded out the stations.

Hebron Bible Church, in conjunction with a couple of other local churches, sponsored and organized the father-son event. Organizers had two goals in mind: to call peo-





Our goal was that the event would be Gospel-infused — meaning that participants would hear the Gospel multiple times throughout the day. Presenters at a few stations took a couple of minutes to share their testimony of how a relationship with Jesus had impacted their lives.

When the sessions were finished, participants enjoyed a barbecue meal, while door prizes, donated by several local businesses, were given away. As a special gift to him, Nebraska coaches had Jack suit up for a play that has now garnered more than seven million hits on YouTube. Brown explained, "Like any typical man, he had his own direction he wanted to go. He was going the wrong way. The play was supposed to go to the right. Jack started running left, and there were no blockers on the left side The most interesting part of the play was that our quarterback, Taylor Martinez, grabbed the kid and pointed him in the right way, and he took off down the sideline Like young Jack, all of us start off going the wrong way. Someone had to come along and show us that there is a right way."

At the end of the evening, Ron Brown patiently answered questions and signed autographs as volunteers began to clean up. The smiling faces and comments from those who attended echoed the thoughts of event organizer Brad Seitz. "Adventure Day was a special occasion for all because it was such a Godhonoring event," Seitz said. "Sharing our relationship with Jesus Christ and our passion for what the Lord has blessed us with was awesome."
